Call to Worship:

Eric: O God, Lent has been a long journey.

People: Now the long shadow of the cross and the footsteps of Jesus find us waiting at the gates of Jerusalem.

Eric: We have arrived.

People: Yet it seems the journey is still not complete; there is a deeper journey still to make.

Eric: This Lenten wandering has been just the beginning.

People: The greatest story is still to be told. Come let us gather at the gates of the city; the

crowds are preparing to enter.

Eric: Come, let us gather in worship.

May we be your supporters today, O Jesus, where we know the saviour you are, where we intend to follow you from gate to garden. Scripture: Luke 19: 28 - 40 "Welcome to Jerusalem" by Gail Pratt

For many weeks Jesus had been journeying to Jerusalem. Friendly Pharisees had warned him not to go to the city where Herod ruled. Disciples had tried to keep him away. But Jesus knew it was God's will.

On the way, Jesus taught many people about God's love, and healed many people with God's love. Now the time had come to go into the city of Jerusalem.

When Jesus, and the disciples travelling with him, reached Bethany, they stopped at a place called the Mount of Olives. Jesus called two disciples over. "Go into the village. At the edge of the village you will find a colt that has never been ridden. Bring it to me. If anyone asks what you are doing, say 'The Lord needs it.'"

With those instructions, the two disciples went to the village of Bethany. They found the colt, just as Jesus had told them. As they were untying it, they were asked, "What are you doing?" The disciples answered as Jesus told them, "The Lord needs it."

They brought the colt to Jesus. Then they threw their cloaks over the colt and Jesus got on it. A curious thing happened as they got closer to the city of Jerusalem. As Jesus rode along, the disciples spread their cloaks on the road.

You know how a gathering of people can draw more people? That is what happened, and soon a big crowd – a multitude of disciples – began to shout, "Praise to God!" "Blessed is the one who comes in the name of God!" "Peace on Earth!" "Glory in the highest heaven!"

In the crowd were some Pharisees. They were afraid that all this noise would get the attention of the Roman soldiers. One of them said, "Teacher, tell your disciples to be quiet."

But Jesus answered, "If I tell them to stop and they stop shouting, the stones would shout out praises to God."

Jesus continued to the city. The people continued to shout praises to God.

Message: "Day of the Palms"

Today is the day of the Palms or as most of us know it as Palm Sunday. The story today recalls the triumphal entry into Jerusalem, at a time of anticipating the celebration of the Passover or for Christians - Holy Week. Even in the celebration Jesus speaks truth to the power and continues to extend grace to sinners. Jesus is true to God's mission – and Jesus knows where God's mission is leading – to his very death.

In today's story we are told that people spread their cloaks on the road and throngs of disciples shout triumphantly because of the deeds of power they have witnessed along their journey with Jesus. For the people, Jesus is their new king. Jesus knows that his kingship will be different from what the people are expecting. Jesus has shared that his kingship is revealed in his betrayal, death, and resurrection. All of that is yet to come. Today though we celebrate.

Jesus enters Jerusalem riding on the back of a donkey, recalling the messianic promise: "Your king comes to you...humble and riding on a donkey", from Zechariah 9. Kings serve by ruling, but Jesus rules by serving. Jesus gives it all. The people are living in the destructive power of the Roman empire, so any person who could offer the hope of freedom from Roman rule were honoured and built up. The joy shown by the people today as they follow Jesus into Jerusalem is based on their hope not being held to the power of Rome. Their hope is based on what God will do as they have seen God's power revealed in the life of Jesus.

If we could imagine that we were among the crowds greeting Jesus as he entered Jerusalem, what power would we hope for. Going against the political rulers of the day would mean probable hurt - even death. Yet would we also get caught up in all the hype of this event of triumphal entry into the City of God? As we imagine what might our experiences have been like, what emotions do you think you would have felt?

Where might we see similar parades in our world today? How about the Truckers Freedom Convoy in Ottawa. For 23 days starting in late January, downtown Ottawa served as a parking lot for hundreds of heavy-duty trucks, pickup trucks and other vehicles, operated by individuals who said they were fed up with the social restrictions and vaccine mandates meant to contain the spread of Covid-19. The Freedom convoy blocked downtown Ottawa for traffic and several businesses had to close during the Convoy. Of course, since so many truckers where in Ottawa, the

lack of shipments of auto parts shut down several Canadian Auto plants. On February 9th, another convoy shut down the border crossings from USA to Canada, causing even more shortages.

On February 13th Canadian police arrested 25 truckers and towed several vehicles and later that afternoon the crossings where reopened. The next day, our Prime Minister Trudeau declared a state of Emergency - that allowed the crossings to stay open and the ability to clear the truckers from downtown Ottawa. On February 18th, Ottawa and the RCMP drove out the protesters. Over 200 people were arrested, and the blockade was officially over.

How does the Truckers Convoy relate to the Palm Sunday Parade? To start with there are several differences. The people of Jerusalem could not openly protest, so their protest is named the "Triumphant Entry in Jerusalem". We are told that the Pharisees told Jesus to quiet down the people, so their enthusiasm would not get the attention of the Roman Soldiers.

In Canada, there were people from our area in Southwestern Ontario who took weekend trips to Ottawa to show support for the truckers – none of them even being truckers. They share the enthusiasm of a peaceful protest and the amount of fun it was supporting the truckers. In the news, we heard of the anger and destruction of statues and store fronts. In any protest, we seem to get the ones who celebrate our ability to protest, and those who make trouble and destruction during what is to be a peaceful protest.

We in Canada have the ability to protest for events that are happening around the world – such as the Ukrainian War. We as the church in our local area collected \$2,660 to send to help those in Ukraine. Could that also be considered a peaceful protest? It definitely shows we want to help in helpful and tangible ways. It also shows the world that the church is attuned to its brothers and sisters and we wish to live out our ministry by helping those sufferings we see in the wider world. As we enter Holy Week we as the church reach out to trust that God continues to create in our world, even if we have no idea what will happen. That is what our Holy Week Journey is all about.

This Palm Sunday provides the entry point into the week called Holy Week. We journey through Holy Week knowing what is about to happen. Some of us can't wait to get to Easter. Others cherish these days, as they believe that even in Jesus' death and burial, God is not done with Jesus yet. We trust that if it can happen to Jesus – it can happen to us. That gives us a Palm Sunday type of hope. Hope in

God, versus hope in the world. The Holy Week stories beckon us to live with trust and in good - when all is well, and when all is not well. We may know the rest of this biblical story, but we don't know how God will work in our hearts this year to see the Passion of Jesus in a whole new light. Today we too celebrate - as we follow Jesus into Jerusalem, to witness his passion and trust, that we might in turn be faithful witnesses who trust God in word and deed, in life and in death. We do not do it alone. God is always with us. Thanks be to God.

blessed is he who brings his love.
Let us join to sing his praises;
