# **Call to Worship:**

**Eric:** Imagine a world where God takes shoots and buds and uses them for large purposes. **People:** Imagine a world, where baby cows and baby bears play together in peace and harmony, where lions and lambs live together in safety.

**Eric:** Imagine God's world, where God's Holy Mountain provides refuge, peace, and safety. **People:** We come to the mountain to worship the One who takes the tiniest shoot and uses it to signal the Hope of God.

## Lighting of the Advent Candle:

Eric: Come and let us build a new creation to find a way through the wilderness together. People: Let us imagine how we might turn around and learn from that tiny green shoot of new life.

Eric: In the wildness of this moment, we wait for the dawn to break and to give light to all who find the landscape bleak and full of shadow.

**People: We need light to guide our feet into the way of Peace** (*Light the first purple candle*). Today we light another candle in our constant need **for Hope** (*Light the second purple candle*). **Eric:** With this one light, we pray:

People: O God, we place this light in this holy space as a reminder that we are on this journey together. Be light along all our paths. Lead us to a more just world and help us to stay awake and present to your love in each ordinary day. Amen.

#### Hymn: VU 44 "It Came Upon the Midnight Clear"

It came upon the midnight clear, that glorious song of old, from angels bending near the earth to touch their harps of gold,
'Peace on the earth, good will to all, from heaven's all-gracious King!' The world in solemn stillness lay to hear the angels sing.

Still through the cloven skies they come with peaceful wings unfurled; and still their heavenly music floats o'er all the weary world; above its sad and lowly plains they bend on hovering wing, and ever o'er its Babel sounds the blessed angels sing.

#### Children's Story & Lord's Prayer:

#### Children's Hymn: VU 6 "A Candle is Burning"

A candle is burning, a candle of peace, a candle to signal that conflict must cease: for Jesus is coming to show us the way; a message of peace humbly laid in the hay.

A candle is burning, a flame warm and bright, a candle of hope in December's dark night. While angels sing blessings from heaven's starry sky, our hearts we prepare now for Jesus is nigh.

#### Scripture: Isaiah 11: 1 - 10 "God's Mountain"

Hello. My name is Isaiah, and I am a prophet. A prophet is someone who tells people about God. A prophet wants all the people to listen and learn about who God is and what God does. Life is difficult for the people of Judah, where I live. The people of the land are afraid and sad that other nations are trying to take over, and they feel that God is not listening to them.

I was thinking about all of this, and suddenly a picture came into my mind. I knew that God wanted the leaders and people of Judah to hear about it.

The picture was of a tree that had been cut down; it was just a stump, its life and beauty gone. But from the root of that tree, a new branch would grow, and it would become a strong tree again. I told the people not to give up hope; just like the new branch that grew from the stump of the tree that seemed dead, a new leader would come. This leader would have the Spirit of God and all of God's knowledge and understanding. This person would be happy and really enjoy knowing God by seeing and hearing about all the good things God has done and will do. Caring for the poor and teaching bad people to be good would be something for this person to do.

The rest of my story was about what would happen if God made all things good and safe. I told about a mountain where no one would be hurt, and all the animals would live together. No animal would hunt and kill another animal for food. All the animals would live peacefully on the mountain, and a child would lead them on the mountain. The child would teach the world about God and all the good things God can do. No one would harm or destroy anyone or anything else on this mountain. Everyone and everything in the whole wide world would know about God. They would know that God is everywhere, even in the biggest ocean. They would know that all the people have been a part of God's plan, and all the people will be a part of that plan in the future.

#### Message: "On God's Holy Mountain"

We were talking the other day how we are already in the Second Week of Advent and it doesn't seem possible that Christmas is under three weeks away. During past Advents, we are running around getting ready for Christmas, as we set our sights on Christ's coming, and the celebration of Christ's birth. This year it seems that Advent is here and we are not yet ready.

Today's story shows us the Reign of God as the Hope for a world where everyone and everything lives in harmony on God's holy mountain. Isaiah says "A shoot shall come out from the stump of Jesse". Jesse was King David's father, so "stump of Jesse" is a reference to kings who followed David. To call that line of rulers a "stump" might have been shocking to those who thought the Davidic line would continue forever. Have you seen what looks like a dead stump, and new shoots appear and grow to become a new tree? This is the metaphor that Isaiah uses to show the people of Judah who were living in exile in Babylon, that the line of David will continue. The people of Judah lived in exile in Babylon in the sixth century BCE. For those in Exile, it would seem the Davidic dynasty had ended in their exile from Jerusalem.

We are told that God's Spirit will equip the "shoot" from Jesse's stump with qualities needed for just rule. The prophet is clear about the power of God's Spirit and God's intent for shalom for all creation. There is hope here, not despair. Today we celebrate Hope. Hope is promised in this new shoot, which with God's Spirit will come to vision through a righteous ruler and a peaceable kingdom.

Using animal imagery, Isaiah takes us back to creation – a time of perfect harmony, and then re-creation – a return to that time of harmony. Isaiah promises dramatic change. Isaiah shares that God's power as Creator, grounds our hope in transformation – God created all things, and God's power can renew all things. Again, with the use of the images of animals, the predator and prey will come together, reminding us of God's power to renew. Like the perfect world God created in the first place. If God can do it once, God can do it again. This time we are encouraged to help recreate.

In the Sundays of Advent leading up to Christmas Day and the birth of the Christ Child, we are asked to imagine a new world. "The work of the imagination is serious business because through it we build or destroy the world." Isaiah calls us to imagine a world where opposites co-exist and thrive peacefully. Isaiah calls us to imagine a God far more wondrous, than we can ever comprehend. Isaiah asks us to imagine what our lives can be like if we dream of building God's world.

For the people of Judah, exiled in Babylon, they are looking for hope. Isaiah gives them a dream of a new reality where God's kingdom comes to all of us. For us today in the 21<sup>st</sup> Century, especially following COVID, we are hoping for a renewed normal to our lives. We as a society deal with violence – in our nations, our neighbourhoods, and our homes. It is easy to give up hope.

As mentioned earlier, this year, we are not ready for hope. Maybe we have not given up hope – is it the same, if you are not looking for hope. Or does hope find you? Will hope be there and ready when we need it? May we this year, be surprised by the transformation we see this Christmas in God's world. What role might we play in that transformation?

We believe the shoot that comes out of the stump of Jesse, is David and then Jesus. On this Sunday in Advent, we focus on the theme of hope. Does our hope lie in the abundance of this creation, or the possibilities to come? In our lives today, can we reach out to welcome one another, and live together in harmony? Can we offer others Hope? Maybe we are not ready for the Hope of Christmas, but chances are that others in our community need the Hope we offer.

We might very well be a candle of hope in December's dark night. Let us do our part to build the kind of community that Isaiah is sharing that God is creating; a community where all live in harmony, a community where we feel as close to God as the People of Judah did at Jerusalem. Because we are not alone. God is always with us. Thanks be to God.
