Scripture: Luke 6: 27 - 38 "Jesus Talks About Love"- by Doug and Pat Jackson

Jesus often talked about love to his friends. "That's because loving is the most important thing we do," he said to them.

"But who should we love?" asked Mary.

"Yeah," said Peter. "We can't just love everybody."

"We can, Peter. But it's hard," said Jesus. "So why don't we all sit down here on the grass. I'll tell you some things about love."

"Love the people who don't like you," said Jesus. "Love the people who say mean things to you. When you pray to God, talk about those people. Say to God, 'Please help me love them.'

"Suppose someone hits you. Don't hit them back. Be kind to them instead.

"If someone takes something away from you, don't yell and fight. Give them something else.

"Be kind to others, the way you would like them to be kind to you."

"Those are tough things to do, Jesus!" said Peter.

"I know," said Jesus. "It's easy to love the people who love you. It's easy to love your friends. But God wants you to do more than that – something that is hard."

"Will God help us love people that are hard to love?" asked Mary.

"For sure," said Jesus. "When someone does something you don't like, try this. Don't do or say anything for a little bit; just breathe in and out a few times. Then, in your mind, ask, 'God, what should I do?' Then breathe in and out a few more times. Then God will put an idea in your head, and that idea may be to go and talk it over with some other people."

Mary and Peter looked at each other. It still seemed impossible.

"Do you know why you should do that, Peter?" Jesus looked at his friends. "Do you know why you should love like that, Mary?"

Both of them shook their heads. They didn't know.

"Because that is what God does," said Jesus.

"But I thought you said God was sad when someone is mean or steals something," said Mary.

"Yes," said Jesus. "God is sad, just as you feel sad when someone does something bad. But even when God is sad about the things we do, God keeps on loving us. People do many things that make God sad, but God never stops loving them."

"Is that what you mean when you talk about living God's way?" asked Peter.

"Yes, that's what I mean. It's not an easy thing, but you can do it. God gives you so much love; you have lots to share with people who are mean or who hurt you or steal from you.

"And you know something else?" Jesus looked around at his friends. "When you give away lots and lots of love, you'll find it all comes back to you. When you give love away, you always find you have more love than you started with."

"Does that mean we have to kiss and hug everybody?" asked Peter.

Jesus laughed. "No. Some people don't like to be hugged and kissed. When you love someone, you think about the good things they do. You do kind things for them whenever you can. You say kind things about them. You try really hard to be their friend."

"But what if they just laugh at you?" asked Peter. "What if they say you're stupid and just walk away. Or maybe they even hit you?"

"I didn't say it was easy," said Jesus. "And it may take a long time – maybe years – before they stop acting that way. But you keep trying. Over and over and over. And it's a good thing to talk to God about it in your prayers. That way you'll become a stronger person each time you show that kind of love."

Message: "Living As Disciples"

People can and will get different things from the Bible. Part of this is due to the Bible's diversity; part is influenced by what people are looking for when they approach it. Perhaps you want to know about the history of God's people. Perhaps you want hope in a time of personal trial. The Bible gives us a variety of narratives, advice, comfort, and challenge. Many of the passages are not new ideas but responses to the wisdom and events at the time of writing. This makes the Bible an interesting read when we look to its words for insight into our times 2,000 years later. Is the Bible still relevant today?

In today's story from Luke, Jesus relates to the wisdom of the day and interprets God's commandments for this time. Jesus teaches disciples that it's not enough to love what is easy to love. We must go deeper, higher, wider and love as God loves – as a gift freely given, regardless of the worthiness or response. Jesus continually pushes his followers to greater and greater depths of compassion and higher and higher visions of love and inclusion.

Jesus understood scripture developmentally. He pushes us to move to the next stage of spiritual maturity; to hear stories and instructions with new ears, to meet

characters with empathetic eyes. "Be merciful, just as your Father is merciful" is a call to delve into our own vulnerability to see our mutual need for forgiveness, healing, and restoration. Two weeks ago, we shared about being holy because God is holy. These are all lofty visions.

Today's lesson may seem to set high standards, but Jesus is not asking us to be perfect on our own. Our holiness cannot be achieved alone but can be achieved with a faithful relationship with other like minded disciples. We are the church. Holiness is wholeness. We cannot do it apart from divine love.

As we strive to grow into the people God imagines us to be, as we follow the commandments and the way of Jesus, let us remember that what we will become is more beautiful than what we can imagine because it is God who has created us.

Luke shares about Jesus' controversial claim about those who believe and act differently: Love your enemies. Sustain all regardless of your judgment of them as good or bad. Be merciful for God is merciful – to go beyond what is comfortable and forgive, reserve judgment/condemnation, be merciful. Here, Jesus turns our focus from an obsession with perfection to a posture of compassion.

Yes we will have difficulties with the difficult ones; forgiveness, holding back judgment, showing mercy, but like weight training, the more you do it the better it works. It takes practice – maybe even daily practice for us to more Christ-like. For humans it is natural to judge. Jesus says we do not need to stay there. We can foster compassion for people we feel a need to judge. Jesus says take a few breaths, send out a silent prayer, take another couple breaths, and see what happens. In those small breaks it allows our minds to process what has just happened, and how we might compassionately care for that person.

When we admit the need for others, we can be more holy in the sense of being connected and a part of the whole. We as the church are full of vulnerable people with vulnerable people: children, adults in the last quarter of life, or our partners in mission and outreach. Our church community is deepened and brightened by the presence of vulnerable people. We learn from each other and we care for each other.

Likely in church we learn more about compassion than anywhere else in life. We are in relationship with each other, and we take the time to know one another. Together we worship, and in the worship service we are led by their voices as they offer scripture and song. Unfortunately we seldom say thank you for the

opportunity to be in a relationship with each other and our mission partners. Yet they bring us joy and understanding to our world.

Our hearts are influenced by what we do. Therefore, how blessed or cursed we feel can be a result of not what we receive in life, but what we give from it. Christ's love and teachings are written on our hearts. We are not perfect, yet in working in community we can transform our world. We are not alone. God is always with us. Thanks be to God.
