Scripture: Luke 4: 14 - 21 "Jesus' Hometown"- by Madeline Shanks

Have you heard the news? Jesus is back in town. Everyone is talking about what he's been doing."

The news of Jesus' return spread quickly through the town of Nazareth, Jesus' hometown. The people had heard about all the wonderful things he had been doing in other cities. Today was the Sabbath, and now they hoped to hear and see for themselves what Jesus had been saying and doing. They were sure Jesus would come, for this was the synagogue where he had gone so often as a little boy.

Everyone arrived early. They removed their sandals, covered their heads with their prayer shawls, and quietly sat down. In the middle of the room was a platform where the reader stood. The scrolls of God's law were kept in a little cupboard behind a curtain at the front of the room. The leader took out a certain Bible scroll and chose several people to read parts of it and then say a few words about that reading.

Soon Jesus entered with his disciples and indicated to the leader of the synagogue that he would like to be a reader. The leader nodded his head and then handed Jesus the scroll that the prophet Isaiah had written. Jesus unrolled the scroll and found the place where he wanted to read.

"God's spirit is with me. God has chosen me to tell the good news to the poor, to tell everyone that the prisoners are free, to give sight to the blind, to free people from their suffering, and to tell people about a new time. This is the year God has chosen."

And then Jesus added, "Today these words have come true." Jesus rolled up the scroll, returned it to the leader and sat down.

The eyes of the people were fixed on Jesus. They were impressed with Jesus and were amazed at the words he spoke. This was no ordinary rabbi!

Message: "Spirited Voice"

After so many months in a pandemic, we long for good news. Good news for this earth, good news for our hearts, good news for our communities. May we listen for God's good news as we share about how we should live in following Jesus as a Christian. We are called forth to be the hands and feet of Christ in our world today...

In today's story, Jesus' speaks at his home church. There is excitement in the town of Nazareth this morning. Word has gotten back to Nazareth about what Jesus had been doing in other towns. The people of Nazareth know Jesus as Joseph and Mary's son. They know Jesus as the town carpenter, the one who built their table or fixed their door. Surely since Jesus is back in town, he would attend the Sabbath worship. They were are not disappointed. Jesus enters the synagogue with his disciples.

Mary and Joseph are known to be good Jews. They observed Jewish customs, such as dedicating their week old child, heading to Jerusalem to observe Holy Days, and Luke shares other stories of their faithfulness. Today's story is about Jesus and his faithfulness to his Jewish faith. Jesus honours those traditions. Jesus observes the Sabbath by going to the synagogue in his hometown of Nazareth. He stands to read scripture and sits to teach, as was the custom of rabbis.

Jesus is handed the scroll of Isaiah. Jesus begins by reading a passage from the prophet Isaiah. We do not know if this choice was his or was a designated reading for that Sabbath. We as modern day Christians are unclear whether there was a set cycle of readings from the prophets in Jesus' day. Either way, the Isaiah text shares the words Jesus wished to share. This was the work Jesus was doing. Let us hear those words again. "God's spirit is with me. God has chosen me to tell the good news to the poor, to tell everyone that the prisoners are free, to give sight to the blind, to free people from their suffering, and to tell people about a new time. This is the year God has chosen."

And then Jesus added, "Today these words have come true." Jesus rolled up the scroll, returned it to the leader and sat down.

With these words, according to Luke, Jesus begins his public ministry by announcing, "Today these words have come true". Over these three weeks of Epiphany we have been sharing each Gospel's suggestions of Jesus beginning his ministry. In Luke, we hear of Jesus' Baptism, last week we hear in John of Jesus providing wine from water for the wedding. Today again in Luke, we hear Jesus' ministry in his hometown of Nazareth.

What is the gospel of Luke saying about Jesus in this story? Jesus lifts up a passage that begins by referring to the Spirit of God who "anointed me." The literal meaning of Christ is "anointed one." Isaiah's reading speaks of the ways of God in terms closely associated with Luke's portrayal of the ministry and teachings of Jesus. Anointed by the Spirit, Jesus brings the good news of God – release, recovery and setting free. All this would be fantastic news to the People of Israel in Jesus' day as they still lived under Roman rule. The scriptures share to us, that God will help us understand and practice God's good ways.

With the Spirit upon him, Jesus teaches about God's good ways and good news to those whose lives have not experienced goodness. Such ways and news cry out to be heard and done today, as we are two years into this pandemic. We as middle class Canadians may not experience the day to day bondage that others in our world

may experience. The COVID pandemic doesn't care. It becomes a threat to all of us regardless of our wisdom, money or social status. Today this scripture tells us this is the day the Spirit empowers us with boldness and trust.

From the sign of the Spirit resting on Jesus at Baptism through this early story of his mission and ministry, we see how the Spirit is working through Jesus and can work in our communities. In our imaginings, hopes, and prayers, may we become the fulfillment of all that is possible. Can we imagine that the Spirit of God is upon us? How can we dream God's dream and then be inspired to act?

Last week we talked about the questions we ask ourselves when we as the church are looking at local missions; we asked, "What's missing in our community"? versus asking, "What's possible in our community"? Each question leads you to a different frame of mind towards different answers. What is possible with the Spirit of God upon us? What might be God's dream for our church community? Do we feel we have the Holy Spirit's power to work towards God's dream? Jesus says, "Yes we do!" We can transform our community and the world. We are not alone. God is always with us. Thanks be to God.
