Scripture: John 1: 1 – 18 – "The Light of the World" (Read by Sean Nicholas)

Imagine a long, long time ago when there was no world. No stars. No animals. No people. No you. Just nothing.

Now imagine that even though there was nothing, God was there.

God was there like a strange light that is everywhere, but doesn't come from anywhere. The light didn't shine on anything, because there was nothing to shine on. Can you imagine that?

Then God had an idea. God decided to make the universe, and the earth, and to fill it with all kinds of creatures, and with all kinds of people like you and me. And in each person, and in every living thing, and in everything God created, God put some of the light that was there before there was anything. You have some of that light in you. People can see that light shining in your eyes when you laugh. Sometimes they also see God's light when you cry.

Then God had a very special idea about a very special person. God decided to make a person who would come and live with us to show us what God is like. A special person to show us how to live God's way.

There was a man named John. God sent John to tell us about the very special person that was coming.

"Look," said John. "You can't see God because God isn't a 'something' you can see. Nobody can see God. But God will send us a person to show us what God is like. God will send this special person to tell us about that wonderful light that all of us have – God's light that comes to us from the time before there was anything.

"The name of that special person is Jesus. Jesus will help you shine. Jesus will help you find God's light that is inside you. Jesus will help you live God's way."

Message: "We Wait In Love"

This week we have moved from the birth of Christ to witnessing Christ at work in the world. Today we are invited to be a part of that work. When we see who we can be through the power of Christ, we can see how God's love reaches to all the world, and how we engage the world being the church of Jesus Christ.

The first verses of the first Chapter of John is the only "Christmas story", that John shares with us. John is all about the "who", not "how". John shares with us that Emmanuel – God-with-is, doesn't dwell in the specifics of a human birth as Luke does; with Mary, the angels, the shepherds, and the wise men. For John, all we need to know is that somehow "the Word" becomes flesh and becomes a part of

our world in a new and tangible way through Jesus of Nazareth. John connects the event of God breaking into our world – Emmanuel - with our relationship with God. Because the Word has become human, we also being human, can recognize and respond to God in entirely new ways.

In Matthew and Luke we hear stories of Jesus as a human child – Jesus is at the temple being dedicated and then circumcised when he was a week old. Matthew shares that Jesus is a year or two old and living with his mother in a little house somewhere, there are sages and scholars traveling to see the king whose star pierces the heavens no matter how long it takes. They arrive on January 6^{th} , the Feast of the Epiphany. In the season of Epiphany we leap through time for the baptism of Jesus as an adult. We have three weeks to hear and understand those special stories of Jesus' childhood, and understanding of Jesus' divinity.

But for John, stories of Jesus is all about the divine adult. John shares the idea of his Trinity; of the Living Word, the Unending Light and the One who is Eternal Life. The good news is the unending light for us in a world where darkness is scary, cold, and maybe even final.

How do we view our relationships between darkness and light? In John 1, John starts, "In the beginning before God created light there was darkness". We may be afraid of the dark but God is not. Darkness is a creative space to God. Out of darkness God created everything that is, including light. Could we consider that light and dark are not in conflict, but in balance?

We as humans usually like to think in polar opposites, good/bad, light/dark. Yet we believe God to be supreme - therefore God doesn't have any competition. For God, life and death are not opposites. We are born to die and die to live. We pass through death to live again. It is called resurrection!

We are called to live a mature faith in a complex world. There is light and dark, shadows and more than fifty shades of gray. The darkness and light co-exist. There is always shadow. We can't see in the dark. We trip over the smallest thing. But it is not the dark that hurts us. It is our own limitations. Because of our blindness, we need Christ to light our way. Christ is the light that allows us to see the light in all people and all situations.

John uses many images of darkness and light. We too as the church use in our liturgy images of darkness and light. We as the church that is left to our human ideals, we use darkness or unknowing to judge others, mostly unfavourably. Jesus

the Light, helps us to see through the shadows and darkness to see the value in all people. Something that we humans do not naturally do.

John says, Emmanuel – God with us in the form of Jesus, will help you shine. Jesus will help you find God's light that is inside you. Jesus will help you live God's way. Once again we are reminded - We are not alone. God is always with us. Thanks be to God.
