God gave us eyes to see them, and lips that we might tell how great is God our maker, who has made all things well. R **

Scripture: Genesis 1: 1 – 2:4

Reflection: "The Community of Creation"

At the beginning of time, God expressed delight in Creation and declared all Creation "very good." On this Trinity Sunday we are reminded that there are many

ways that we celebrate how God is revealed in and through continuing relationships within Creation. God entrusts remarkable potential to all that is created. New beginnings emerge as the community of Creation lives into such promise.

It is believed that today's reading in Genesis took shape when the people of Judah lived in exile in Babylon. In response to their captors, who insisted that their rulers held all power, these exiles told a story about their God that insisted otherwise. Genesis did not originate as a scientific explanation of how all things came to be. Instead, it emerged as an assertion of the power of God, from whom all things came to be – and in whose hands the past and the future remained.

In Jewish tradition, retelling scripture's story enables listeners to enter that story as if it were ongoing. God's creative activity continues. Our fashioning in the image of God is more than a story of long ago. God has not finished with Creation or with us. We are empowered by our identity as made in the image of God and entrusted with a caring relationship with all Creation. We have the opportunity, maybe even the responsibility to co-create with God.

God blesses both creatures and humans. What is the meaning of "dominion" bestowed upon human beings? Many associate dominion exclusively with control. Dominion, however, has a different meaning when heard in the context of the "image of God." God's dominion does not exhibit itself in exploitation, but in compassion and responsible care. God entrusts dominion to us as a responsibility, not a licence to abuse.

This narrative of Creation concludes with God blessing the seventh day. We call this blessing Sabbath. Sabbath reminds us that work does not wholly or finally define life. It does not for God. It does not for us. Sabbath bears the gift of rest. Remembering Sabbath celebrates the grace of God.

Today's reading in Genesis forms a liturgy of creating word and faithful response that includes all that God created. Imagine this account coming to life. Use your senses to see, hear, smell, touch, and taste life bursting all around you. Proclaim that everything, in the words of God, is very good.

On this Trinity Sunday we also proclaim the relationships we share with God the Creator, Jesus the Son and the Holy Spirit are also good – very good. As the church moves forward into our newly created future, what hopes and purpose for our church may we see God has created or is creating? As we journey into the future, we will journey with the community of Creation. We are connected with all of creation, whether we like it or not. We get to co-create.

On this Trinity Sunday, as we look at the Community of Creation, how might our brothers and sisters in Nova Scotia, Saskatchewan and Alberta feel about the creation of destruction of their communities because of the forest fires? What kind of creation was God thinking?

Yet we know that forest fires allow the forests to rejuvenate. The fire clears out the dead wood and sickly trees and vegetation. Fires allow some seeds to open up and release new growth. In Northern Ontario in the next year, following a fire is a healthy crop of wild blueberries, as they excel with the fertilized soil and the ability to get full sunlight and rain. These wild blueberries are fabulously sweet and grow big. When you come back after the vegetation has grown up, even a few feet, the blueberries revert back to small and a more bitter berry. They no longer get the light and are crowded out by other plants for water. Nature can change quickly.

Yet as people who live in the early 21st century we are well aware of global warming. This awareness gives us the opportunity to remember the creation story and know that God continues to create regardless of the chaos we humans dream up. We as humanity are working on opportunities to co-create a different story line with a different outcome. Being grounded in our creation story helps us feel connected to nature and that it is our role and responsibility to make creation good!

In today's story, there is a continuing motion of God creating things: "And God said, 'Let there be..." However, there is a transition when God creates humans. "Then God said, 'Let us make humankind..." This curious "us" can have the reader wondering who is with God? John tells us that Jesus and the Holy Spirit was with God from the very beginning. Is it the Holy Trinity as God?

Creation is good, including humanity. "God saw that is was good". How can we say to ourselves or to another human, "We are not good". How can we say, "Creation only has value in what we can harvest and take from creation"?

On this Trinity Sunday, we consider Creation and Trinity's relationship with and within Creation. Genesis tells us that in the beginning - the goodness of all of creation is repeatedly declared. The orderliness and goodness of all creation may be difficult for us to grasp unto, especially when we see and face chaotic circumstances. Tragedies and natural disasters challenge any of us as humans, even when we know, "It is all good".

Trinity Sunday is the bridge between Pentecost Sunday and the season after Pentecost that follows. The transition is understandable, for the theme of Trinity

invites us to explore the various ways we experience God's activity among us as Creator, Redeemer, and Sustainer. But notice the first of those affirmations: God as Creator. To take this naming of God seriously is to affirm that encounters with God can never be divorced from Creation. The first story of our "beginnings" (the literal meaning of Genesis in Hebrew) asserts time and time again the goodness at the heart of Creation. We are to celebrate the goodness in Creation. We are to co-create the goodness in Creation.

We are not alone. God is always with us. Thanks be to God.
