Scripture: John 9: 1 - 41

Reflection: "New Vision"

God can help us to see the ways we can turn the ordinary elements of life into something amazing. In faith we can shift our perspective to place the Holy Spirit at the centre, and then we will look at the world differently.

Our Psalm today is the 23rd Psalm. When we place God at the centre of our lives we can see how God shepherds our whole lives. In the times of David who is credited to writing the 23rd Psalm, he describes God as the shepherd who leads the

people out in a new exodus, caring for their needs and offering protection. Ordinary fields and pastures are sources of food and places of refuge and shelter. When we read the 23rd Psalm it shifts our vision towards God, and we know that we are not alone. The possibilities can become endless.

Today's Gospel story is where Jesus heals the blind man to see. It is with ordinary elements; mud and spit that a blind man is able to see. When have we experienced ordinary elements of our lives - and see the extraordinariness that comes from God? All through the Gospels we see God's restorative love being expressed in Jesus' life and ministry.

Blindness and other ailments were often viewed as punishment for sin in ancient times. This is the assumptions of Jesus' disciples and of the Pharisees of Jesus' day. This was a common thought for the leaders of Jewish religion; the Pharisees and the Sadducees. Jesus speaks against this thinking saying that this man blindness was not of his sin, nor his parent's sins. Jesus says, "Because of his blindness you will see God work a miracle". Jesus spit on the ground and mixes up some mud and smeared it on the man's eyes. "Go wash off the mud in Siloam Pool". The man did as Jesus asked him to do, and as he washed off the mud, the man could see.

Everyone around the man wondered if he was really the blind man who begged in the streets. "I am that man", he says. "Then how can you see?", they ask. The man tells them, "Jesus made up some mud and smeared it on my eyes. He told me to go wash it off in the Siloam Pool. When I did, I could see". Siloam means, "The one who is sent". What relevance does the name have to do with the blind man?

But the story does not end there. No, Jesus has healed the blind man on the Sabbath. Keeping the Sabbath was very important in practicing Judaism. Its weekly ritual of renewal reflected the God who "rested", on the seventh day of creation. In today's story, Jesus' healing on the Sabbath angers the Pharisees who guard the Jewish laws. The Pharisees say, "This man Jesus doesn't come from God. If he did, he would not break the law of the Sabbath". At issue is what can or cannot be done on the Sabbath, and the Pharisees are going to make a point of Jesus' healing on the Sabbath.

"Kneading" was technically forbidden. Jesus' making of mud could be viewed as "kneading". The larger question involves Sabbath and healing. Has Jesus broken or kept the law by performing this act?

You may remember the 2003 movie "Bruce Almighty". Jim Carrey plays Bruce Nolan, a down-on-his-luck television reporter who complains to God (played of

course by Morgan Freeman), that God is not doing his job correctly and Bruce is offered the chance to try being God himself for one week. God tells Bruce that he cannot tell others he has God's powers, nor can he use the powers to alter free will. Bruce is initially jubilant with the powers, using them for personal gains, such as getting his job back, exacting revenge on a street gang that bullied him earlier, and impressing his girlfriend.

Bruce finds ways of using his powers around Buffalo to cause miraculous events to occur at otherwise mundane events that he covers as the reporter. Bruce continues to hear voices in his head and re-encounters God, who explains the voices are prayers that Bruce must deal with. Bruce creates a computerized email-like system to receive the prayers and respond. Immediately Bruce finds that the influx is far too many for him to handle and sets the program to answer every prayer "Yes" automatically.

Chaos ensues. As Bruce looks around, he realizes that Buffalo has fallen into chaos due to his actions. Bruce returns to God, who explains that he cannot solve all the problems and Bruce must figure out a way himself. Bruce then starts to help others without using his God powers. He returns to his computer at home and goes about answering prayers earnestly. Eventually God takes back over – Thank God.

What happened in Bruce Almighty is similar to what happened in Jerusalem after Jesus healed the Blind man. The healing creates division within the community. Neighbours divide over whether this is the same man they had known. Pharisees divide over whether Jesus is from God or not. The man's parents distance themselves from their son for fear of the religious leaders. The threat of expulsion from the synagogue would be like expelling yourself from your community.

The transformation of the blind man is not just from blindness to sight. Initially, the blind man is a passive recipient of Jesus' actions, but he becomes more active as the story goes on. By reporting what has happened, he becomes a teacher of theology to the teachers of theology. Eventually, this healed one becomes a disciple of Jesus - the one who healed.

With some mud and some spit, Jesus changed the life of a blind beggar. These ordinary elements were used to change not only the life of one person but also a community as the news of the miracle spread. When we see these healings as gifts from God, our perspective can change. When we see those we think we can ignore or they are not important to us, and then see the way God sees them – as individuals who are valued and have worth – our entire world view can change as well.

Encounters with God move us beyond what we have previously thought. Jesus healing the one born blind did that for the religious authorities.

We might think that "Life in Christ" is dazzling and brilliant. At times it is, at other times we must look at the world differently. We are called to trust God to help discern what is right, even though we do not see it. Today's story of mud and spit and a swimming pool may seem fairly commonplace as we wipe our children's faces or dive into the deep end. Yet for God, we see extraordinary healing and a excluded blind man once again being part of the community.

In today's story we see the chaos the healing causes in the community as they ask lots of questions. We are encouraged to look at this story through the eyes of God. What may we have not noticed before?

With grace Jesus heals the blind man, but so much more happens. In the 23rd Psalm, we see that God's grace is with us. We are not alone. God is always with us. Thanks be to God.
