Scripture: Acts 9: 1 - 20 "Saul Sees in New Ways" by Charlene Doyle

Saul was breathing fire against the followers of Jesus; he went to the High Priest and asked for letters to synagogues in Damascus that would give him authority to arrest followers of Jesus, men or women, and bring them to Jerusalem to be prosecuted.

As Saul reached the outskirts of Damascus, a bright light flashed all around. Saul fell to the ground. Saul heard someone speaking. The voice said, "Saul, Saul, why are you hurting me?" Saul, his voice muffled in the dirt, answered, "Who are you?"

"I am Jesus, and you are hurting me. Get up now and enter the city, and you will be told what you are to do."

Saul's travelling companions had heard the voice but saw no one; they were speechless and shaking a little in fear. After a moment or two, Saul stood up but stumbled and reached out to grab his friend's arm. Two of them caught him and helped him to find his balance.

Saul looked around, blinking – "Why is it dark? Have I been dreaming? Is it the night?"

"No," they replied. "Why do you ask?"

"I cannot see," Saul replied, and none of them spoke or moved.

Saul's friends snapped out of their shock, saying, "You've had a fright and are in shock. We will lead you to Damascus."

For three days, Saul could not see. And all that time, he didn't eat or drink but prayed, listening for the message from God that he was told to expect.

About this same time, God spoke in a vision to Ananias, a follower of Jesus who lived in Damascus. "Ananias!" "Here I am," he replied. "Saul of Tarsus is staying at the house of Judas on Straight Street. He is praying; in a vision, he sees a man called Ananias lay hands on him and restore his sight."

Ananias hesitated, then said, "You don't mean me, do you? But this man has done great harm to many of Jesus' followers in Jerusalem – and he has come here to arrest more of us!"

"Yes, Ananias, I know. But Saul has changed," God said. Ananias went and found Saul. He put his hands on Saul's head, saying, "Brother Saul, I am sent by Jesus who appeared to you on your way here, so that you may regain your sight and be filled with the Holy Spirit."

At once, something fell from Saul's eyes, like fish scales, and he could see again. He got up and was baptized. After eating some food, he regained his strength.

Saul stayed several days with the disciples in Damascus, listening to stories about Jesus and asking many questions. And Saul began teaching about Jesus in the synagogues, saying, "Jesus is God's chosen one."

Saul was Jewish, but he told many people who were not Jews about following Jesus' way. They called Saul by a different name – Paul.

Message: "Going Global"

Can you imagine what it might have been like for those first early Christians - who once where persecuted at Saul's hand – to now after Saul's conversion to Paul, listen to him preach the gospel of love and grace to them? Even Ananias, when faced with the call to look for Saul, as Jesus had changed Saul's heart, would remember that Saul had persecuted the early church so violently. Would Ananias be walking into a trap – where he may be violently hurt or even killed?

Today's reading speaks of the change in one person – a change so huge that Saul becomes a new man – not only in character but also in name – to Paul. It seemed that quickly the whole believing community realized that Paul was a changed man – not just a wolf in sheep's clothing. Ananias was the first to trust, and then the rest of the community accepted and included the one, Paul, who once persecuted them, as Saul.

Paul, as we know was sent out, or at least he traveled all over the Middle East sharing the story of Jesus the Christ. Paul believed that Jesus' story and Jesus' salvation was to be shared with the whole world – which was the Middle East in Paul's time. Paul took his message - Globally, we might say. How do we, the church today, take our message globally? We offer a helping hand to those in tough situations throughout the world. Our help in many times can make the difference between life and death, especially when it comes to World Hunger.

We in the United Church offer gifts to help those globally with gifts to the Mission and Service and to the Canadian Foodgrains Bank, as well as other global interests such as appeals when earthquakes or catastrophe hits an area. World hunger is addressed by both, yet hunger is specifically the work of the Canadian Foodgrains Bank.

World hunger is a growing problem. We as the church are part of the solution. We have taken steps to work toward a world without hunger. Some crazy statistics are that around 768 million people in the world experience hunger, that works out to almost 10% of the World's total population. We know that 98% of people experiencing hunger live in developing countries, and we are finding out that Climate Change has made a bad situation into a terrible situation for the people of developing Nations. We also know that close to 80% of displaced people live in countries that are affected by long-term hunger.

The Canadian Foodgrains Bank is a partnership of 15 church and church-based agencies working together to end global hunger. Together, our members represent nearly 30 Christian denominations made up of over 12,000 individual congregations across Canada.

Each of our members has an account at the Foodgrains Bank that they can draw from to provide food assistance during emergencies around the world and to fund programs that support families and communities in their efforts to access more and better food in the long term.

We provide additional financial support through a general account and access to matching funds for eligible programs. The Canadian Foodgrains Bank also provides advice for design of programs implemented by our members through their local partners and support for evaluation and assessment to ensure that programs are meeting their intended goal to end hunger.

We are told, "The only constant is change" is an expression of which many are familiar but whose reality is often met with resistance – especially in the church. We as the church witness globally of Jesus' passion and life changing abilities, by giving of our gifts – which is usually money. We do that through partners such as the Canadian Foodgrains Bank. Together we can make a change – a big change – even a life or death change to some many people around the world, by working in partnerships with our sisters and brothers in Christ. We do not do it alone. God is always with us. Thanks be to God.
