Scripture: John 17: 1 - 11

After Jesus had finished speaking to his disciples, he looked up toward heaven and prayed: "Father, the time has come for you to bring glory to your Son, in order that he may bring glory to you. And you gave him power over all people, so he would give eternal life to everyone you give him. Eternal life is to know you, the only true God, and to know Jesus Christ, the one you sent. I have brought glory to you here on earth by doing everything you gave me to do. Now, Father, give me back the glory I had with you before the world was created. You have given me some followers from this world, and I have shown them what you are like. They were yours, but you gave them to me, and they have obeyed you. They know that you gave me everything I have. I told my followers what you told me, and they accepted it. They know I came from you, and they believe you are the one who sent me. I am praying for them, but not for those who belong to this world. My followers belong to you, and I am praying for them. All I have is yours, and all you have is mine, and they will bring glory to me. Holy Father, I am no longer in the world. I am coming to you, but my followers are still in the world. So keep them safe by the power of the name you have given me. Then they will be one with each other, just as you and I are one."

Reflection: "The Glory of God"

This intimate prayer in John 17 concludes the "Farewell Discourse." This is sometimes called Jesus' "high priestly prayer." Like the high priest who prayed on behalf of Israel, Jesus prays for others on the eve of his death.

As we get closer to Pentecost, we can see the early church slowly transforming, taking the experience of encountering the risen Christ and trying to find ways to make it real in their world. The Spirit, Jesus prays, will help the disciples to understand more and more of all that Jesus has shown and taught them. Today we as the modern church, we step into this prayer to know the glory of that witness for ourselves.

Jesus offers this prayer immediately before entering the Garden of Gethsemane. Here in John's gospel, Jesus is described as affirming the hour that has come as one of glorification. The prayer's power lies in Jesus' request that God will protect the disciples (the church) and keep them (the church) unified. Jesus prays for those

called to embody God's love in his absence. If God's love is seen, it will be through their (and our) witness.

This emphasis on unity does not mean that all Christians are expected to agree but rather the fervent hope that we will recognize that what unites us is far greater than what divides us.

"Glory" in John has to do with the revealing of God. It is how God becomes known to human beings. It is something that the disciples have already seen and heard in the signs that Jesus performed in his life. They tasted it in Cana and smelled it in Bethany when Lazarus was called back to life. Jesus wants even more glory for his disciples. This prayer ends with the hope that they will see the fullness of glory in "love". It is not mere togetherness that Jesus prays for his "invented" family but the fervent hope that we will find intimacy with God.

Jesus' "invented" family in Acts 1, when Christians are called to be Christ's very sisters and brothers – that includes us today. We are called to listen to God's word and do it.

As many churches seek to grow in their understanding of Christian unity and beyond that to the interconnectedness of all creation, we remember Jesus' simple plea that "we all be one". Simple, but not always easy. Integrated into the United Church Crest is the saying in Latin, "That all may be one". How interconnected are we to other Christians beyond our congregation? How interconnected do we feel with all of creation?

In her book The Wisdom Jesus, Cynthia Bourgeault observes:

"In the gospels, all the people who encountered Jesus only by hearsay, by what somebody else believed about him, by what they'd been told, by what they hoped to get out of him: all those people left. They still leave today. The ones who remained – and still remain – are the ones who have met him in the moment: in the instantaneous, mutual recognition of hearts and in the ultimate energy that is always pouring forth from this encounter. It is indeed a wellspring." We talked last week of the Holy Spirit leading us to what's next. May the Holy Spirit take us there.

We just need to look to the Book of Acts, where we hear the resurrected Jesus tell the disciples of the "power" that will come upon them. This power speaks of the new choices, actions, voices, and values that will go into the world through the spirit of the witness of Jesus' followers. Is that what we are looking for in our churches – for our churches?

In John we see prayer as a vital ingredient in coping with the realities of the world. Let us keep praying for the Holy Spirit to make a difference in your community?

We may be familiar with Jesus' prayer that "all may be one". Often, we take this to mean all churches, or all Christians, or – perhaps on the outside – all people. The prayer of Jesus can be a springboard to explore our connectedness with one another – people we know and like, and those we may not know or may not like – including those right here in our churches. Soon we will be exploring our connectedness with other people from another church, whom we do not know. At the same time, we can explore our connectedness with all of creation: the flowers, rivers, rocks, sky. Our creation stories remind us that we "all are one".

Will this all be easy? Look at the disciples - they had to work out what this all means and how to live that out. The disciples were energized by the Holy Spirit on the Day of Pentecost to share the message of who Jesus is – in words. As the disciples helped the early church into existence, there was plenty of prayer. When things went sideways, the disciples discerned where God was leading them. In prayer they could hear the voice of God. They didn't walk away and head back fishing. They worked to form the early church so "All may be one".

Let us discern, pray, listen, work out what this all means and how to live it out. Let us do this as "all may be one". Because we are not alone. God is always with us. Thanks be to God.
