Responsive Psalm: Psalm 78: 1 – 7

What God Has Done for His People My friends, I beg you to listen as I teach. I will give instruction and explain the mystery of what happened long ago. These are things we learned from our ancestors, and we will tell them to the next generation. We won't keep secret the glorious deeds and the mighty miracles of the Lord.

God gave his Law to Jacob's descendants, the people of Israel.

And he told our ancestors to teach their children, so that each new generation would know his Law and tell it to the next.

Then they would trust God and obey his teachings, without forgetting anything God had done.

Scripture: Joshua 24: 1 - 20

Joshua called the tribes of Israel together for a meeting at Shechem. He asked the leaders, including the old men, the judges, and the officials, to come up and stand near the sacred tent. Then Joshua told everyone to listen to this message from the Lord, the God of Israel: Long ago your ancestors lived on the other side of the Euphrates River, and they worshiped other gods. This continued until the time of your ancestor Terah and his two sons, Abraham and Nahor. But I brought Abraham across the Euphrates River and led him through the land of Canaan. Then Joshua told the people: Worship the Lord, obey him, and always be faithful. Get rid of the idols your ancestors worshiped when they lived on the other side of the Euphrates River and in Egypt. But if you don't want to worship the Lord, then choose here and now! Will you worship the same idols your ancestors did? Or since you're living on land that once belonged to the Amorites, maybe you'll worship their gods. I won't. My family and I are going to worship and obey the Lord! The people answered: We could never worship other gods or stop worshiping the Lord. The Lord is our God. We were slaves in Egypt as our ancestors had been, but we saw the Lord work miracles to set our people free and to bring us out of Egypt. Even though other nations were all around us, the Lord protected us wherever we went. And when we fought the Amorites and the other nations that lived in this land, the Lord made them run away. Yes, we will worship and obey the Lord, because the Lord is our God.

Reflection: "Know Who to Follow"

Today's story summaries the Exodus journey once the Israelites have settled in the Promised Land. They are living the freedom that they were promised and received from God. They are living in a land of good fields and pastures. They are living in peace. The Israelites have been liberated from the slavery of Egypt, They have settled in the new land, because of God's liberation.

We as humans do not do a good job of figuring out how to permanently move people from one place to another. There are very few places in the world that are barren – and if it is barren, it is because nothing will grow there – especially not people. Even several hundred years ago when we as Europeans came to North America, we needed to remove others from the land, so we could set up our European ways of growing food, cutting wood, and mining resources that we sold to and shipped back to Europe and the home country. Several hundred years later we are trying to right the wrong.

The Israelites have spent many centuries of war and domination to stay living in that Promised Land. In the next 1,200 years, up to Jesus' day, the Promised Land

was under Assyrian, Babylonian, Persian, Greek and Roman Rule. In some cases the Israelites were dragged off the Promised Land and exiled as slaves in their rulers homeland. Even in Jesus' Day the Israelites could live, farm, work the land, but they had to pay taxes to Rome. Today and for the last 60 years the Israelites continue to hold control with military might. But as we all hear in the News, some one, some where are always fighting – a push here, a push there – and basically the rest of the world stands by – not sure what to do, so it seems we do nothing.

We, as modern day North Americans, several hundred years ago were liberated by God's grace. After we sent the English, the French and the Spanish back home, we started to make deals to trade and set up political agreements to leave each other alone. So today we live life liberated from slavery, injustice and other worldly blunders. We live in very peaceful conditions, we get to have a say in our leaders with our votes every four years. We can own land, houses, cottages, cars and other luxuries. Of course through taxes we pay for all the infrastructure that it takes to operate any of these luxuries. But we live our lives liberated from the many pitfalls that other societies have to deal with on a daily basis.

How did we North Americans luck out? The easy answer is to say, "In God we trust". It may seem there has been some of that in our history. As we settled in Southwestern Ontario, or any other place in North America it wasn't long before churches sprouted up everywhere across the countryside, towns and cities. Churches immediately became the gathering place for the local community. Offering prayers of grace for our blessings, offering rituals for all of life's transitions; birth, marriage and death, holding community dinners and potlucks, offering a place for the local school to practice and perform their plays, pageants, musical and orator events.

Soon after the return of Veterans from the Second World War, as towns and cities grew – churches grew. They added on Christian Education wings, with lots of stairs to the many rooms. Buildings were full. Money was good. Denominations grew, and trust funds grew. Churches were working with government on education, hospitals and other areas of societal needs. Maybe this all needed to happen to bring us into the 20th century. But these everyday ministries, who are being used by everyone, no longer has any affiliation to their founding members. Most people do not know that all major Universities in Canada were started by the Methodists, Presbyterians, Lutherans, Anglicans, Roman Catholics, Baptist and the list could go on. Most people do not know that many of our modern day hospitals where built and operated by many of these same denominations, along with the Salvation

Army, and a few more key players. They use all the services, but do not realize how it got there.

Why were we involved in the finer things of life such as Health Care and Education? Because we believe that God wanted North Americans to have every opportunity to live life to the fullest and therefore we chose to serve God!

North Americans have every opportunity to live life to the fullest! Many folks don't. Why? I wonder who they are following. How is that working out for them? I am thinking of the very successful people who are addicts, including celebrities. I think of those who have all the money in the world but succeed with suicide.

How do we keep our faith in the midst of all that the world throws at us? We chose who to follow, who to serve and who to believe. It is not always easy. God's story is not finished. Each and every day, we continue to write God's story in our own lives and faith. Like the United Church Creed reminds us - We are not alone. God is with us. Thanks be to God!
