Scripture: Matthew 25: 31 - 46 (in Story Form)

The disciples were full of questions. They wanted to know when the world would be filled with God's love and what that world would be like. Jesus wasn't exactly sure when that would be, but his stories helped the disciples imagine, wonder, and think deeply about how we should live. Sometimes the disciples found it hard to understand.

"What does a world filled with God's love look like?" the disciples asked again. Jesus asked them to use their imaginations and imagine a ruler.

"Imagine," Jesus said, "people from all the nations in the world gathering around the ruler. The ruler has been watching the people very closely, and whenever the people had lived in God's loving ways, the ruler smiled and felt the love, too. Imagine the ruler saying to the people, 'You gave me food when I was hungry. You gave me a drink when I was thirsty. You welcomed me when I was a stranger, and you gave me clothes to wear when I didn't have any. You took care of me when I was sick, and you visited me when I was in jail.' Imagine the people saying: 'When did we do these things that you say we did?' Imagine the ruler saying, 'All of the times that you did these things for any person, I felt the love.'"

"Ahhh," said the disciples, "we are beginning to understand. We are all part of God's family, when we help one another, when we help the poorest and weakest members of God's families, when we help and show compassion to those in greatest need, we are caring for God."

Jesus smiled and nodded.

Message: "Who Do We See?"

Today's scripture is about the work we do as the church for our local community. More than ever during the years, the weeks leading up to Christmas is the most active times for the Church to be helping our community. Next week is the first Sunday of Advent. Today's reading prepares us for the work ahead. Jesus tells us when we look after the least, we are being like Christ.

How do we as the Church respond to the needs of the wider community? Usually we do it with our money. As much as we may want to do it physically, we may not have the skills, knowledge, or time to be there personally. We know there are people who do have the skills and knowledge. Being there and helping out the vulnerable in our community is their job. They have the training. They understand what their clients need. They have the compassion and energy required to help. What they need more than anything is funding to do that work. That's where we come in. In Blenheim, the Christmas Basket Program is sponsored by the Blenheim Ministerial, the organization that is a collection of the Blenheim and Area Churches, who offer food and gifts to the Program. But we do not necessarily do the work – we have a team of dedicated volunteers who have the knowledge, skills and energy to ensure Christmas Baskets are available to those who need them. We offer our gifts to those who prepare and distribute the goods. Together we are a team.

The Christmas Basket Program is bigger than what any one church can do – so we do it together. Together we can do so much more. Together, the churches and the community offer their compassion for those Jesus reached out and helped. This month we all work together to reach out and help. We help by offering money, food, gifts and hygiene products.

Do we see the people who are suffering? Matthew suggests that this is a critical question for the early Christians. It remains a crucial question for us Christians today. But in reality, we do not see those who are suffering. Although we might not see them, those who do, are reminding us to help.

In our Rural Communities, it may be hard to find folks suffering. That is not to say they are not there. We do trust that they are seeking help from the agencies we fund and are part of. Therefore, we as Rural Churches offer help to those folks who look after the wider Community – such as the Merlin Community Assistance, the Blenheim Christmas Baskets, or the Merlin or Blenheim Food Banks.

Yesterday we as citizens of Chatham Kent came together to offer food and toys – a "Gift" to those who need a hand this Christmas. Our donations to "The Gift" has stocked the Merlin Christmas Hampers in a new way, as we live in the pandemic. We could not do our yearly fundraising and community gathering as we have always done it. We are still there to help, to lend a hand, to stock the cupboards, and to offer a "Gift" to families this Christmas. We worked together, as we do each year, to make this a great Christmas for everyone.

We are all part of God's family, when we help one another, when we help the poorest and weakest members of God's families, when we help and show compassion to those in greatest need, we are caring for God." We are not alone. Thanks be to God.
