Scripture: Deuteronomy 26: 1 - 11

After the people of Israel escaped from Egypt, they lived in the desert for 40 years. They often didn't have enough food to eat or enough water to drink.

Then their leader, Moses, brought them into a new country where there was plenty to eat and drink. So they asked each other, "What should we do to say thank you to God for bringing us to this wonderful country?"

This is what they decided.

"Every year, when we gather all the food from the fields, we should remember that God gave us this food. We should give some of it back to God. If we have ten baskets of grain, we should give the first basket to God. If we have ten bunches of grapes, we should give the first bunch to God. If we have ten new lambs in our flock, we should give the first one to God."

"But how are we going to do that?" some of the people asked. "God is everywhere. And anyway, God doesn't need food or clothes. God isn't a person like you or me." Then the people of Israel had a good idea. "We'll take these things to the Temple." A temple is like a big church. "Then, hungry people can go to the Temple and get some food. And people who need clothes can go there and get something to wear. "That way, we can always say thank you to God. Because God has given us so many good things. And when we help people who are hungry or lonely or hurt, we are doing it for God. Then we are living God's way."

Reflection: "The People Say Thanks"

Moses led the Israelites out of slavery in Egypt. They wandered in the wilderness for forty years, living on manna that God provided daily. Now, the Promised Land is in sight, and Moses is speaking to the people about their new lives in a new land. He urges them never to forget that God has cared for them, and in gratitude to God, they must give thanks and share what they have.

After forty years in the wilderness, Moses instructs the Israelites about God's covenantal way of life and blessing in the Promised Land. Deuteronomy shares what Jesus teaches us. Offer some of what you have when you can. We never know when we might need it ourselves. In Jesus' day and especially in Moses' day, the bounty from the land was a daily part of your everyday life. Everyone knew where their food came from. They also lived the life of one day you may have food, the next you don't. The bounty from their land was provided by God. They could not grow the food without God's blessings of rain and sunshine. The Hebrew people had a festival to celebrate the harvest.

In the Moses' story today, we may remember that the Hebrew people had been enslaved in a foreign land. They had just spent the last 40 years wandering in the wilderness – that is like two generations. God offers them a new commandment emphasizing the abundance of a "land flowing with milk and honey" that God was giving them as an "inheritance to possess".

Offerings of grain and fruit grown in the very soil of that land would confirm the fulfillment of God's promise to Abraham in Genesis 12. Israelite worshippers were

to emphasize God's gift of the land by affirming, "Today I declare to the LORD your God that I have come into the land that the LORD swore to our ancestors to give us", and "God brought us into this place and gave us this land, a land flowing with milk and honey. So now I bring the first of the fruit of the ground that you, O LORD, have given me". Words found in today's story.

According to Jewish tradition, first fruit offerings were made of seven species native to the land: wheat, barley, grapes, figs, pomegranates, olives, and dates. This specificity may encourage us to locate ourselves within our own particular contexts today, giving thanks and offering what we have been uniquely given by God for the prospering of our neighbors and the larger community.

While all of us depend on agriculture for sustenance, fewer and fewer people in Canada and elsewhere in today's world live on farms or are involved in working the soil. Reflecting on this passage in more contemporary terms, what might be examples of the "first fruits" that we offer to God, our families, and the congregation or community, out of grateful recognition that everything promoting life, health, and peace has been given to us by God?

In my investing teaching, our manta is: 10% to God, 10% to yourself (saving or investing), and live on the 80%. In the 21st century we equate our givings from the fruits and vegetables of our fields to the dollars of our pay cheques or pension cheques.

The Hebrew exodus out of Egypt and the entrance into the land was challenging and dangerous. Yet even in those uncertain times, God responds to the Israelites' cries for protection. God also offers the amazing power to deliver from oppression (such as the parting of the Red Sea) and to provide for a future filled with hope and abundance (to the land of milk and honey). Deuteronomy suggests the Israelites remember their past and rejoice and give thanks for their present blessings.

We too might remember our difficult journeys; either by individuals, families, and the larger community; Journeys with cancer, divorce, drug addiction, failed crops or loss of your job. Yet we now see that God preserved us through those trials and brought us to a new place from which we might enjoy and share what we have richly received. We too give thanks.

The offering of first fruits, ensures that the entire community shares in the land's abundance. Israelite landowners and their families are instructed to partake of the harvest together with "the Levites and the aliens who reside among you". The Levites, generally equated with the priests in Deuteronomy, were a tribe not allotted

a territory of their own but were rather supported in their religious service through such offerings – much like I am supported by your congregation. The second group mentioned, the "aliens," were foreigners who lived among the Israelites without owning land – for us today would mean the poor and needy. We do offer our food and money for these outreach ministries.

Deuteronomy gives the Israelite people a "proverb" to live by and as they remember their past, and look towards their future. What "proverb" might we use today to help us recall and remember those who passed on their faith of thankfulness, and how we observed how they lived their faith in giving — in both difficult times and times of milk and honey? Today in thankfulness we remember those gone before us. We are one, in the Holy Spirit. We are so thankful! We are not alone. God is always with us. Thanks be to God.
