Scripture: Mark 10: 46 - 52 "I Can See" - by Mike Authier

Every day blind Bartimaeus would hold out his begging bowl as he sat by the side of the road near the town of Jericho. Bartimaeus knew this town well. When it was springtime, he could tell by the feel of the warm breeze and the scent of the harvested wheat and barley. When it was autumn, he could tell by the crisp chill of the air and by the smell of herbs, and grapes, and later the olives that farmers brought to market in their creaking carts. Bartimaeus knew everything that happened on that road. He heard the merchants in their booths hawking their fresh produce. He heard the buyers and sellers haggling over the price of every item, from the most expensive tapestry to a handful of lentils. He heard the bleating sheep and goats being herded into their stalls. And he heard the children laughing and squealing in delight as they ran and played with each other. Yes, Bartimaeus knew his town, but he longed to see what he could hear, smell, and feel.

Now Bartimaeus had heard stories of how Jesus could cure all kinds of illness. And Bartimaeus made up his mind that if ever Jesus came to Jericho, he would ask for his help.

Then one day, Jesus came.

Bartimaeus heard the noise of a great crowd of people coming along the road. He heard their whispering, laughing, and excited voices. "What is it? What is it?" he called out. "Tell me what you can see."

"Haven't you heard?" answered someone. "Jesus is passing this way, and we're all watching for him. He is coming right now."

Bartimaeus' heart began to beat faster. He could not see, but there was nothing wrong with his voice! Bartimaeus began to shout, "Jesus of Nazareth, help me. Please, help me!"

Now the crowd was surrounding Jesus.

"Jesus of Nazareth," Bartimaeus raised his voice even louder, "please be kind to me!"

Many people around Bartimaeus sternly ordered him to be quiet, but Bartimaeus cried out even more loudly, "Jesus of Nazareth, please be kind to me!"

And then Bartimaeus heard one voice above everyone else's. It was Jesus' voice. Bartimaeus stood up and stretched out his hands to feel his way to Jesus.

Jesus looked at Bartimaeus lovingly and asked, "What do you want me to do for you?"

"Oh, Jesus," said Bartimaeus, "you have the wisdom to open our eyes to many wonders of God's way. Please make my eyes see again."

And then Bartimaeus felt Jesus' gentle hands on his eyelids.

Bartimaeus stood very still hardly believing what was happening to him. He lifted his head and colours swirled all around. God's beautiful world was full of colour. And then Bartimaeus saw Jesus. Bartimaeus shouted and sang for joy. He could see!

From that day on, Bartimaeus would follow Jesus. Bartimaeus would tell everyone about this wonderful miracle!

Message: "What Do We See?"

There is an Australian Aboriginal quote from Queensland in 1970 that says, "If you have come here to help me, you are wasting your time. But if you have come because your liberation is bound up with mine, then let us work together". Many times we in the church think we know what our community needs. We are good at helping in the obvious places, but what is it that those we help feel they need?

In the past, the United Church and its predecessors the Methodist and Presbyterian Church, signed in with the Federal Government to look after our First Nations People. History has shown us that this was not extremely helpful. What is it that our First Nations fore parents wanted from the Society of Canada? No one asked.

One day, I was in the grocery store standing in line, to pay for a few things I was bringing home. I was in a hurry as I had a Zoom call that I was leading in the next half hour. I was growing increasingly impatient as the woman in front of me exchanged coupons for groceries as she had her purchases scanned. When her purchases exceeded her money, she had items eliminated one at a time until her groceries met with what was in her wallet.

So thinking I was being the helpful, caring pastor that I am, and that I wanted out of there, I placed money on the counter to make up the difference. The woman

continued to return items from her basket, one at a time. Now I was confused and somewhat annoyed that someone in apparent need would refuse this such a charitable response, so I asked her why she did not welcome my gift. She responded, "But you did not ask me."

Ouch, Touché I deserved her response. I did not ask her, if I could pay for her purchases. I assumed she would want me to do so as it was obvious to me she needed me to do that. Or was it that I needed to do that. Either way, I had not asked and she wasn't willing to accept what she didn't need or want.

How often are our well-meaning ways more for us than the other – or about our perception of someone else's situation? When and how might we impose our ways? Does imposing our way actually disempower people who are willing to do the best they can, with what they have got?

We as the church are to be sensitive to the cries of our community. When we hear those cries, may we listen while we stand still, and when we know what they are crying for, discuss with them what they might need – if they really want us to help them with their need.

This seems so obvious in the church today. In our bible story today, we hear Jesus asking the beggar, "What do you want me to do for you?" "What do you want... me to do for you?" Jesus did not asked, "What can I do for you?" But, "What do you want me to do for you?" Maybe the beggar had been blind all his life and he wanted a blessing or something else. Our assumption is that he wants to see because we can see. If he has been blind all his life, seeing may not be a gift. Yet if he has become blind recently - then being able to see, makes his life full again. May we ask, as Jesus asks.

Bartimaeus plays an active role in his story we hear today. He persists even as the crowd attempts to silence him. In fact, Bartimaeus turns up the volume. When Jesus calls to him, Bartimaeus responds vigorously. He throws off his beggar's cloak. He springs up. When asked, he articulates his greatest need.

Jesus stands still when he hears Bartimaeus' cries. He allows himself to be distracted from his journey towards Jerusalem for the sake of another. In contrast to those who wanted to keep Bartimaeus quiet and on the margins, Jesus calls out to him, and asks the very same question Jesus asked of James and John last week, "What do you want me to do for you?"

Bartimaeus imagined a different world - a world in which he could see. In his world before Jesus, Bartimaeus was known as the blind beggar. He would be silenced when he dared to speak up. It could be hard for him to imagine that his world would ever change. But Bartimaeus is motivated to take action. Imagining that Jesus could restore his sight motivated Bartimaeus to take action.

Faith and hope will not be silenced in the face of need, whether our own or others. That is why we celebrate who we are as the Church, and as faithful Christians. We care for others when we ask what they need. We can become a part of a lasting solution, that can change lives, even our own. That is why we celebrate our Church Anniversaries, because our Church and our collective faith and hope actually make a difference. We can change the world – one person at a time. Which at Talbot Street, we have been doing at least 149 years. Thanks be to God. We are not alone. God is always with us. Thanks be to God.

"God of grace and God of glory" was written in 1930 by Harry Emerson Fosdick for the dedication of the famous Riverside Church in New York City, where he was the pastor. As we sing this hymn, perhaps it is helpful to remind ourselves of the events that shaped the "hour" and the "days" that provide the context for this great hymn. "God of grace and God of glory" was written while the United States was in the throes of the Great Depression between the two World Wars. Fosdick was a champion of the social gospel, a movement that recognized the plight of the poor, especially in the urban Northeast during the Industrial Revolution.
