Call to Worship:

Scripture: Mark 10: 2 - 16 "Tough Questions" - by Madeline and Margaret

In the early Christian church, there were different kinds of religious leaders. One group of religious leaders were called the Pharisees. Pharisees believed that it was important to follow the religious laws that had been passed down to them. Another group of religious leaders were called the Sadducees, and they had different understandings of how to follow God. The Pharisees and Sadducees did not always agree with each other. The Pharisees did not always agree with Jesus either, and sometimes they wanted to trick him.

One day, the Pharisees asked Jesus a tough question to test him and to see how he would respond. If Jesus responded one way, then he might offend the Pharisees. If Jesus answered another way, then he might offend the Sadducees. The Pharisees asked the question in front of a crowd so that other people would hear what Jesus had to say.

The Pharisees asked Jesus if the law allowed people to get divorced. Before answering them, Jesus first asked what the Law of Moses said about divorce. They responded and shared that the Law of Moses did allow people to get divorced by issuing a certificate.

Jesus also explained that in God's original creation, when people come together in marriage, they would no longer be separate individuals. Instead, they would form a new union together, and God would bless their union. But, sometimes, relationships fall apart, and Jesus explained that the Law of Moses allowed for divorce since not all unions will last forever.

Sometime later, when they were away from the crowds and back at home, the disciples asked Jesus about divorce again. They wanted to talk about it more. This time, Jesus said very plainly that marriage is about supporting one another and treating each other as equals.

People brought their children to Jesus so Jesus could bless them. When the disciples saw the people doing this, they tried to stop them, but Jesus encouraged the children to come to him and reminded them that God loves them. Jesus spoke of the simplicity of the faith of children.

Then, Jesus reached out and blessed the children. By blessing the children, Jesus reminded all people that all are beloved children of God.

Message: "Challenging Questions"

We wrestle with tough questions, and uncertain answers, likely every day. As we get older we lose friends and loved ones, and we wonder why. Sometimes we are quoted those pat answers that make us cringe. Yet may we have the courage to ask what is on our hearts, as in the asking, we get to share our feelings, which helps us to know we are not alone. May we be kind and loving when someone shares opinions we do not understand. God has made each one of us unique.

Today reading is from Mark, and we are told that the Pharisees wanted to trick Jesus, so they ask him a question. "Is divorce allowed"? Over the years the church has taught us that divorce is wrong.

Divorce already has lots of emotional baggage attached to it, as your marriage did not last forever as you thought it would. It is much messier when children are involved. There are relationships when in laws love and care for their parent-in-laws and do not want that great relationship to end. Of course there is the anger, the disappointments, the difference of opinion, and all the misunderstandings. Divorce is like a death – actually it is the death of your relationship.

The reason given for the dialogue in Mark today, has nothing to do with divorce. We are told the question is asked to test, and probably to coax Jesus into making a statement that would disturb, disrupt, shake things up. Yet there are legal implications to this question. For us in the 21st century there are modern understandings that differ widely from Jesus' day. This very question from the Pharisees also gets our attention today.

The Pharisees' question is literally "is divorce allowed." The correct answer is, "yes." Jesus asks the Pharisees what Moses said about divorce. Then Jesus points out that Moses permitted divorce because of people's "hardness of heart." In other words, we are not the ideals that God intended and hoped for and there will be times when relationships simply fail.

But Jesus turns the question to state that if a man commits adultery against his wife, the woman "can" divorce a man. There was no provision in the Hebrew Law for a woman to divorce a man, suggesting that only the man had the say and the power. Jesus say, "Men and women are equal". Our modern understanding of divorce makes Jesus words uncertain in our minds. We must remember that these teachings of Jesus may have made sense at that time, but times have changed and Jesus' teachings sound harsh to our modern ears.

Divorce was allowed, but divorce was often undertaken without much thought. For women who had little social status, divorce was often unjust. These injustices are what Jesus points out to the Pharisees. Divorce is the human way to handle a human problem – but it is not God's way. God's way is about love and equality.

God's way is shown in the next part of today's story. We are reminded of the importance of approaching life and faith with the joy, openness, and understanding of children. Jesus blesses the children, which is a powerful reminder that we too are blessed by God.

So in life, we will struggle with difficult questions. That does not mean we need to reject them, but instead approach these questions with caution, enquiry and maybe even more questions. Each question we ask may help us to understand a bit more of life, both physically and spiritually. We may explore opportunities about what is allowed. Our questions may help us to understand what is just. What is allowed and what is just are two different answers. Jesus shows us that in today's story. Jesus also shows us the true nature of God. Regardless of the anguish and unjust of our human world, in God's ideal world every one of us is loved by God. This understanding helps us to realize what the Spiritual world will be like. After all, we are not alone. God is always with us. Thanks be to God.

Remembering Jesus:

Eric: On this day when we take Communion with all the world, we offer these symbols of everyday life – bread for the sharing and wine for gladness of heart – we pause and pray.

People: We always remember a Passover in Jerusalem when Jesus borrowed an upper room, soaked and scrubbed the tired feet of others, and explained that there is a God-shaped hole in everyone's belly to be filled with love.

Eric: Remembering is beautiful, but there is not much taste in it. Let us fill our hunger and thirst, by sitting down here and now, as people are doing in so many places, to eat and drink, be blessed and whole.

People: Jesus said, "This is my body, eat this in remembrance of me" (*pause as the bread is broken*). **Eric:** And after that, Jesus took the cup, and said...

People: This is my life-blood, drink this in remembrance of me (*pause as the cup is lifted*). **Eric:** Christ who calls, rescues, and ennobles, fill us with your spirit of strength and compassion for

People: Equip and inspire us to be your people in this time and place. Amen!

Eric: We think of those we are sharing Communion with, in other countries and cultures and their suffering.

People: Then we think of our own community and we have so many questions and concerns about violence within families and we pray for those who suffer because of violence.

Eric: We have so many questions and concerns about earthquakes, floods, and hurricanes and we pray for those who suffer because of them.

People: We have so many questions and concerns about poverty and all who suffer because of it.

Eric: We question sickness and disease and ask why people need to suffer.

People: We question untimely deaths and pray for those who are left to suffer with grief. Eric: We question prejudice and hatred and pray for those who live with them.

People: Suffering God, you hear our prayers, and you let our cries come unto you. With your help, we will comfort and be comforted, strengthen and be strengthened, feed and be fed, shelter and be sheltered, listen and be heard, in the Name of Jesus the Christ.

Eric: With Christ and through Christ, we pray His Prayer...
