Hebrew Reading: Deuteronomy 8: 7 - 18

The Lord your God is bringing you into a good land with streams that flow from springs in the valleys and hills. You can dig for copper in those hills, and the stones are made of iron ore. And you won't go hungry. Wheat and barley fields are everywhere, and so are vineyards and orchards full of fig, pomegranate, and olive trees, and there is plenty of honey. Moses said to Israel: After you eat and are full, give praise to the Lord your God for the good land he gave you. Make sure that you never forget the Lord or disobey his laws and teachings that I am giving you today. If you always obey them, you will have plenty to eat, and you will build good houses to live in. You will get more and more cattle, sheep, silver, gold, and other possessions. But when all this happens, don't be proud! Don't forget that you were once slaves in Egypt and that it was the Lord who set you free. Remember how he led you in that huge and frightening desert where poisonous snakes and scorpions live. There was no water, but the Lord split open a rock, and water poured out so you could drink. He also gave you manna, a kind of food your ancestors had never even heard about. The Lord was testing you to make you trust him, so that later on he could be good to you. When you become successful, don't say, "I'm rich, and I've earned it all myself." Instead, remember that the Lord your God gives you the strength to make a living. That's how he keeps the promise he made to your ancestors.

Scripture: Luke 17: 11 - 19

On his way to Jerusalem, Jesus went along the border between Samaria and Galilee. As he was going into a village, ten men with leprosy came toward him. They stood at a distance and shouted, "Jesus, Master, have pity on us!" Jesus looked at them and said, "Go show yourselves to the priests." On their way they were healed. When one of them discovered that he was healed, he came back, shouting praises to God. He bowed down at the feet of Jesus and thanked him. The man was from the country of Samaria. Jesus asked, "Weren't ten men healed? Where are the other nine? Why was this foreigner the only one who came back to thank God?" Then Jesus told the man, "You may get up and go. Your faith has made you well."

Reflection: "Happy and Grateful Thanksgiving"

Today is Thanksgiving Sunday. Many families have thankful rituals around this day as we understand this day we give thanks. Deuteronomy is about Moses sharing with the Exodus people of Israel to remember how God has blessed them and they must give thanks to God for their blessings.

Moses is preparing the Israelites for the day when they will enter the Promised Land. They will need to remember that they did not enter that land on their own. It is God who is bringing them into that land. It is God who will help them to overcome the inhabitants of that land. It is God who will provide for their needs in

that land. They will have a variety of great and plentiful food, lots of "milk and honey". They shall eat until they are full, and you will give praise to God for your good land and its blessings. Thanksgiving Sunday is our reminder to God's blessings upon us.

I was talking to a gentleman the other day about how he had dropped off from going to church. He had as much money as he needed to live comfortably, but found something was missing. We talked about faith. His background was more to the black and white of faith – heaven and hell, sin and good, etc. His wife had passed away lately and I asked him if he had felt her presence. He was not quite sure, but appreciated there were times when he wondered. We talked about how faith can keep us grounded in the times when life gives us a crisis or two.

Moses is sharing that as the Israelites remember their covenant with God, will keep them grounded. If they forget, and life takes a turn for the worst they will find themselves lost. Remembering what God has done is the way to wisdom and fullness of life. On the other hand, forgetting is the steep winding road to foolishness and a living death.

Moses recaps the miraculous ways that God has the Israelite People during the Exodus. You were once slaves in Egypt and God set you free. God led you through the desert of poisonous snakes and scorpions. There was no water – the Lord split open a rock and the water flowed freely. God gave you manna, a kind of food your ancestors have never seen. God is testing you, so you will trust him. Later God will be good to you.

Moses is sharing that the "Promised Land" will be much more than the Israelites can imagine. They will have prosperity that they have never had before. Yet Moses warns them that when that day comes, remember who is responsible – God. Do not think you did this all yourself.

Another conversation this week was about people not caring about church. I wondered if it had to do with we are so rich, that we don't think God matters? In the midst of prosperity, Moses suggests that people tend to forget the disciplines and the values and the faith that helped to make them prosperous in the first place. In today's world of prosperity, we see many people, especially the younger generation, become bored with their easy lives—and become prey to any number of temptations—drugs, alcohol, promiscuous sex, the list goes on and on. In the midst of prosperity, people are inclined to forget God. The biggest crime is that parents do

not prepare their children with those disciplines, with those values and faith that can help them to be prosperous.

We as the older generation may be the first in our family to receive an inheritance from our parents. Yet we too, have worked hard and achieved much. Is it because we have pulled ourselves up by our bootstraps? Yet how are we setting up our children and grandchildren giving them whatever they need with no connection to how or where the money comes from. Most of our children will rely on us for the rest of their lives. We see it all the time in the community, maybe even in our own families.

On this Thanksgiving Sunday, Moses and Jesus are telling us to remember and give praise to the one who has helped you or healed you. We are to count our blessings and remember where our blessings have come from.

As Jesus enters a village, ten lepers approach calling out to him but keeping their distance because they are unclean. They address him as master, a term used in every other instance in Luke by the disciples. Jesus immediately sends them to show themselves to the priests to confirm their healing, and en route they are in fact made clean.

After the healing of the ten lepers, only one of the ten, turns back glorifying God and thanking Jesus, by bowing down before him. It is only after the one thanks Jesus that we learn he is a Samaritan. A Samaritan, for us today, is someone who is outside our congregation, our church, maybe even our faith tradition. That person is the one who is so thankful.

Think of those churches who serve Thanksgiving Meals today or tomorrow for free. Many of those who come and enjoy, may be like those nine lepers who did not return – for many different reasons. But the ones who do offer their thanks, to anyone who will listen or maybe in a prayer to God, appreciate that someone offered them a meal on this day. Again, their reason could be from many different life circumstances.

Samaritans were not the respectable religious people to the Jewish followers. Jesus' response to the Samaritan is, ". . . your faith has made you well". This Samaritan recognizes that God is at work. Maybe he even understand who Jesus is; God's son. He does know thanking Jesus is glorifying God. Jesus confirms this when he says, "Your faith has made you well".

There is no doubt something to be understood here about the people who live on the margins of our communities, who are treated as invisible or unlovely because of how they look or who they are or where they come from. Jesus clearly notices them. Jesus loves them and Jesus calls us to do the same. Let us give thanks for the blessing God gives to us, and let us remember We are not alone. God is with us. Thanks be to God!
