Scripture: Acts 17: 22 - 28 "Paul in Athens" Story Form

Paul was a wise teacher who travelled far and wide to tell people about God's love and to share Jesus' story with everyone who would listen. As he travelled, he went through many different landscapes and saw many species of flowers, creatures of the forest including birds, animals, butterflies, and olive groves with rows and rows of trees laden with fruit. Paul looked around in amazement at God's creations within the forest. He stopped to take in the smell of the ripening olives and admired the beautiful green foliage of the trees that surrounded the vines; trees with large spreading roots and knotted roots and trunks. The vines and trees that had been in the groves for thousands of years held the secrets of the forest. The fruits of these olive groves provided gifts of food for many generations, and the trees had taken their nourishment and gift of life from the rich soil of Earth. The old trees had sheltered travellers, birds, and other creatures. Paul listened to the wind whistling through the trees. It seemed like the trees were speaking and saying, "We are part of God's great creation, and we have seen God's creation change and grow." The trees had paid attention to the people and creatures throughout many generations. Paul had paid attention to the wonders of creation. Now, as he enters Athens, Paul pays attention to the people of Athens.

When the boat landed, Paul began walking towards the city. He had time to examine everything closely because he was waiting for his friends Timothy and Silas to join him. Paul noticed the many statues to many gods. He wondered about these idols when he saw a sign "To the god with no name." Paul said to himself, "I know who that God is." When he was ready to speak to the people, he was taken to a place called the Areopagus. This was a hill in the middle of the town, and it was where the court met. Paul was to be a guest speaker, and the authorities and others in the court were going to be listening very hard to see if they heard anything wrong in what Paul said. It was illegal to preach about a foreign god in Athens. Paul began by saying that God created all things. He talked about the olive groves; the wind whispering through the trees; and the flowers, birds, animals, and insects that he had seen in the groves.

Paul told the people that he had admired all their temples, monuments, and statues as he walked around the city. These all showed that they were very religious people; Paul was pleased about that. He became excited as he pointed out that the "unknown god" was the one true God – the God of every nation, culture, and religion.

"This one true God is the Creator who has made heaven and earth and humankind," Paul proclaimed. "God is everywhere and doesn't have to live in shrines, altars, and monuments made by human beings. Creator God doesn't need anything that could be given by human hands. God is too big for a statue." Paul then explained that we see how awesome God is when we look at creation. "God gave every living thing its breath and life; caterpillars, worms, butterflies, birds, animals, trees, and forests. God made all the humans who inhabit Earth."

Paul went on to say that God is close to all of us. "We live in God, we move in God, we exist in God. We are all God's children," preached Paul.

Reflection: "Seeing God in the Forest"

When we were on Vancouver Island in 2017, we had the opportunity to go through the Cathedral Grove. Cathedral Grove is located in MacMillan Provincial Park, near the centre of Vancouver Island on the highway which goes to Port Alberni. Cathedral Grove is one of the most accessible stands of giant Douglas fir trees in Canada. Standing at the bottom of these majestic trees is overpowering. The word in our service today is majestic – these trees are majestic as the tower over you up to 75 meters (over 200 ft), and are up to 9 meters (29 ft) in circumference. The oldest trees in Cathedral Grove are 800 years old, which started growing in the 11th century. Majestic is an understatement. Unexplainable emotions and wonder overpower you while you walk through the Grove. Even driving through the Grove on the highway with your car, is truly amazing, as the canopy reaches over the road at least 100 feet above you. It is truly breathtaking.

Last week we asked, "Has God forgotten about us Christians during COVID?" The question we might ask ourselves is, "Where are we looking for God?"

Paul arrives in Athens and as he is looking around he see those statues that they use to honour their Gods. I heard a story once, that the Greek folks had statues of almost every different type of

God – to make sure they where covered. Paul notices the statue that says – "To the Unknown God"! When Paul gets the opportunity to talk to the people of Athens, he shares their commitment to the faith and their Gods and Paul tells them he knows their "Unknown God". Their Unknown God is the God of Creation, the God that has created nature and all things living, including the rocks, flowers, trees and even the grass they walk on.

As humans, we often see life through the lens of our human life experiences. What if we could look at life from the lens of trees, lens of the animals that live in trees, or the lens of the collection of trees - the community of the forest? What does the forest and the trees teach us about God? Our very first story of human creation happens in the forest. Humans use the forest for protection. We use forests to hike through. Hiking through the forest is a whole lot more interesting than hiking along your gravel road. We see so much more in the forest. We can be surprised by the chipmunks who scamper in front of us. We can be awed by the deer we see far off. We stop and watch them as they eat, play and then wander deeper into the forest. We can learn so much walking through the forest.

The forest can be a community much like our church community. The forest is a collection of trees and shrubs, flowers and ferns, rich fertile soil and mud, and the endless selections of animals, bugs, birds and other crawly things. In our Church Community, we too are a collection of people, of rituals and traditions, of past stories and future hopes, and everything else each and every one of us bring to our service this morning. But hopefully most of all the expectation that God is with us, God leads us, and God will provide. Where are we as a community looking for God?

We call our very Church buildings the "House of God". In the past, people came to Church to experience God in this very building. Since March we are not allowed to gather in that building. We have learnt to do Church in a new way – online. Many of us may not find our online services to be - church. But we want to stay connected. Perhaps we could look for God in unexpected places, such as our online service. Where might we see God in our services? How do we see creation in our Services? Do we feel that God is the Creator of technology, of the internet, of Zoom? For many of us the internet is mysterious – we do not really understand how it works – it is unknown to us. It has become our "Unknown God". Yet the Internet is one of the greatest communication tool that humans have ever had. We can communicate our service not only to each other – but to the whole world. Someone in Africa could watch our service each Sunday if they wanted to. There is no cost and it covers the whole world. What a wonderful Creation.

Like the people of Athens, we too search for God. We may search in the most unlikely of places and guess what – we find God. In the community of the forest, in the squirrels and ferns, giant trunks and branches, mosses and shrubs, we find God. In the forest, we share the air with the plants, breathing in the oxygen they exhale, and thanking them for taking in the carbon we breath out, therefore keeping us all alive.

For a least the next month we will be sharing community online. Where do we see God? Keep looking. Keep sharing what comes your way. Share what strikes you as most mysterious or inspiring about our online services. We have never done this before – until five months ago, and what we are doing here today in September is nothing like we did in May and April. God continues to create new – even online. We are not alone. Thanks be to God.
