## Scripture: Psalm 139: 7 -12

Where could I go to escape from your Spirit or from your sight? If I were to climb up to the highest heavens, you would be there. If I were to dig down to the world of the dead you would also be there.

Suppose I had wings like the dawning day and flew across the ocean. Even then your powerful arm would guide and protect me. Or suppose I said, "I'll hide in the dark until night comes to cover me over." But you see in the dark because daylight and dark are all the same to you.

### Message: "Seeing God in the Land / Soil"

We are in the Season of Creation. So today we reflect on our relationship with the land. Land is such an important endowment to us humans. It gives us life, a place of home, and investment in material worth. Being a rural and mainly farming community, the land gives us the bounty of the harvest. Land is the place where we stand, build of homes, and value as important to our material wealth. We use land for the greatest moments in our lives, but unfortunately we also use land for our brutal moments, such as in Europe during both World Wars. This year we are trying to see God in Creation – today's focus is where do we see God in the land, or in the soil?

If we were to look at Genesis 3, we read the story of Adam and Eve and their confused actions over the tree of the knowledge of good and evil. This very tree shows us the good and evil found in the land and soil. Adam and Eve's decision transforms their relationship with the very earth they walk. After eating the fruit of the tree, the land no longer brings forth food to Adam easily. Just as Adam and Eve have a relationship with God and the other creatures - they also have a relationship with the earth. Adam and Eve and all who have heard their story, learn that the land is affected by what we do. The land responds to what we do.

Our Psalm reading today reminds us as we are being knit in a mother's womb. We could recognize that the Earth is a kind of womb. We as humans came from the earth in the Creation Story. We are created by God as earth-beings. Adam is Hebrew for "earth-being", as "adamah" means earth. The Psalm reminds us of the challenge, "Where can I go from your presence?" Where are we looking for God?

Do we look for God in the land or in the soil? We can see God's creation at work in the microorganisms that are at work readying the soil for next year's crop. We as humans understand that when we die, we go back into the earth. I remember my dad taking up a handful of soil on the farm, and instantly knowing by the feel what was needed. Was it ready to work, to plant, or did it need nourishment of some kind. Being on a Dairy Farm and having a herd of over 100 milking cows we had a lot of manure waste. We use liquid manure, and adding that to a field offered many benefits; moisture, nutrients and bacteria that readied the land. After taking off the first cut of hay, we would spread liquid manure to kick start the second crop. Almost immediately the grass fields took off, especially in a dry month. If it was too wet, we would wait until the soil had dried out a bit, otherwise you wasted all the nutrients, if they washed away.

What we do as landowners make a difference to the land we stand upon. Doing events that have no consideration for the land can have drastic results, such as what we see in waste dumps and the fields of war, in the rainforests that we cut down and the wetlands that we drain. Whatever we do to the land either benefits the land or destroys the land.

What would a truly just and repaired relationship look like with the land? We were in Sudbury about 10 years ago and we stopped in the Science North Museum to learn more about nickel mining. Here's what we learnt

What a transformation. That is in Sudbury – what's happening around here? East of Charing Cross, we have the Ridge Landfill. Regardless of what they do – chances are we will find out at some time in the future, we should have done this or that. But when you look at how they look after the area surrounding the land, it's so much more than what townships did for their landfills scattered through the Municipality. Each year we learn more, maybe from cities like Sudbury, or maybe from the Environmental Engineers who work for Waste Management, many of them trained at Ridgetown Campus of the University of Guelph. Chatham Kent looks after Chatham Kent.

Where do we see God in any of this? In Sudbury, we found that the land will grow trees and grass with some help. In Chatham Kent we see a much needed societal land fill being managed with grass, trees and the best landfill soil procedures known to us today. Does this speak of "forgiveness"? God's forgiveness to us humans, as God's children?

Take a moment to sit back and think of your own life. How have your repaired your relationship with yourself, with your neighbours, or maybe even with your family? Are you aware of someone else who has made a real disaster of their life and with forgiveness has cleaned up and are again a great value to their community? Did they find God?

Alcoholics Anonymous in their 12 step program point to God's forgiveness and God's help to beat the pull of Alcohol – The first step is to admit we are powerless over alcohol, the second step is to believe that a power greater than ourselves can restore us to sanity, third step is to turn our will and our lives over to the care of God, fifth step is to admit to God and ourselves our wrongs, take a moral inventory of ourselves, and the sixth step is to be ready to have God remove our defects. Other steps include prayer and self examination.

The 12 step program can work for humans, yet it can also work as humans work to restore those lands we have damaged. We know as humanity we are not perfect, and there are places where we even today are hurting the earth, and the earth responds by being barren. The earth can be a like a mother who does not look after herself during pregnancy, and terrible things can happen – If the earth is our womb, and we are not looking after it, what expectations do we have of our future?

That's who we are as the church! We offer change – even transformation. We help others work towards change, then transformation. Jesus has taught us all about transformation. To transform ourselves and others, we as the church reach out to make a difference. We offer our buildings for AA meeting and other addiction services. We reach out to the homeless with socks and underwear. We send food and supplies to the Food Bank and Soup kitchens. We help out with a Chaplaincy

Program, School Breakfast Programs and Christmas Food Baskets to name a few, because those programs change people's lives. We as the Church are in the business of Transformation. God shows us this in the recreation of the land, and also in the recreation of lost people.

Where do we see God in the land or in transformation? Church Communities such as ours make people holy, make people complete and make people whole. Creating with God and God continues to create new by Transformation. We are not alone. Thanks be to God.
