Scripture: Jeremiah 4: 23 - 28 "Look to the Sky" - by

Prophets are people whose ears and hearts are so open to God that they know what God wants them to say to God's people. A long, long time ago, when people had been hurting each other and creation for a long time, and dishonouring the gifts God had given them, God spoke to the prophet Jeremiah, and Jeremiah spoke to God's people. If Jeremiah were speaking today, this is what he might have said:

Pay attention – your actions have consequences. I looked on the earth and saw a wasteland of wars, hunger and domination. Yet I see pockets of faithful people working against these heartbreaks.

I see land ravaged for oil and minerals. I see toxic rivers from chemicals. Yet I also see my people trying to reverse these devastations.

I looked to the heavens: I see clouds, and even clouds of pollution mixed in. I see society with technology making changes to pollution levels.

Pay attention – your actions have consequences.

I looked on the mountains and I see mining, roads and ski slopes. I see adventurers hiking on trails, some leaving their garbage and others stopping to pick it up.

I looked at the air with birds, some species missing – others that have adapted to your ways.

I looked at the land, again some creatures multiplying, others declining.

I look at the waters and see fish swimming around plastics – yet on the shores people are picking up and recycling plastics.

Pay attention – your actions have consequences.

I looked at the fruitful land. Forests and fields used for human life, with many looking after the soil and reforestation, knowing that nothing can grow in soil drained of nutrients.

I looked at the cities; the crime, the hurt and anger unleashed. Yet I see communities of faith reaching out to the poor and disadvantaged – help as they can.

Listen! God is speaking to us...

Pay attention – your actions have consequences.

No matter what happens in your daily life, this is not the end.

Look to the sky, there will be morning and night – Each morning the sun will rise. Each day, I will be with you. I will not leave you alone.

Look to the sky and see what you have done. Keep working with me to make it beautiful.

Look to the sky and ask forgiveness for the pain and hurt you've brought to creation.

Together we continue to recreate.

Look to the sky and remember my (God's) constant and generous love.

Look to the sky and remember the beauty and wonder of creation.

Look to the sky and do your part to make the world "The Kingdom of God".

Message: "The Sky's the Limit"

Many times in our lives we are awe awestruck by the beauty of God's creation. There are times when we are awestruck at the wonder of our relationship with God. It comes like a pleasant surprise or it could come as a harsh reminder. May we look to the sky and notice creation in the heavens; the mystery of the clouds, the wish upon the stars, and in the warmth of the sun. May we be reminded today that these 120 years of faithful history of St. Luke's is also thanks to God and God's special relationship with each of us. That in our faith we have been a part of the South Raleigh Community for so many years – over a century and many more years before this building was actually built.

Folks pass this church daily on their way to work or home. Do they recognize that St. Luke's is an active church? Many times churches silently do what they do in a community and folks know they are the church when they need the church. Our fundraiser dinners are a open door to the community to come and see who we are. At the same time they are helping us to live out our ministry in their very community.

One Monday morning coming home from Blenheim, I was driving north on Bloomfield. As I rounded the corner at the 16th I was struck by a vivid rainbow just slightly to the road side of St. Luke's. I pulled into the parking lot and framed St. Luke's into the picture of the rainbow. It was an awaking of the beauty of God's creation. The very thought I remember is how the rainbow is a promise from God.

In that vision, not only did I see and marvel at the beauty of the rainbow, but also marveled at my relationship with God, and that we are never far apart.

The sky is likely the biggest thing most of us see daily; if we take notice of it, rather than taking the sky for granted. Sunrises over the waters of Lake Erie or sunsets over the waters of Lake Huron, remind us of the vastness of the sky. On a cloudy day, we can lay on the ground and look at the clouds and see images created by the cloud formations – images that are always changing from one day to the next. On a windy day we can see different levels of clouds passing under each other. We can see those dark clouds coming that tell us it is going to rain. We can marvel at the clear blue sky on a clear day and wonder what's beyond what we can see with the naked eye?

Then later at night in the dark, we can see the stars – on a good clear night millions of stars – way too many to count. We can see and identify those stars that are brighter and/or in formations. We can marvel at the Harvest Moon, the Blue moon or the red moon – each reminding us of the seasons – maybe even the seasons of life. Lighted by the moon we can see the cloud formations at night - a whole new experience from the daytime visions. Night brings it own offerings of beauty to the beholder.

Can we compare St. Luke's to the sky? We do have different times of active ministries at St. Luke's, and we can recount the many times of celebrations and the times of saying good bye to dear friends. We have baptized the new born, and sent our teenagers off to college, university or to a new job in life somewhere across this vast country of Canada. We have celebrated marriages, and marriage renewals, as well as special milestones in our family lives. In the past, the Church hall was used regularly for Community showers – wedding and baby showers. It was used for community meetings and a place for the community to gather.

There are times such as Christmas Eve where the community gathers to share in worship celebrating the birth of the Christ Child. The folks at St. Luke's have been responsible for the Easter SONRise Service, with early morning traffic control and helping at the Lake, but also the crew back at the church preparing the Easter SONRise breakfast, which we all enjoy after the Service. The church is decorated with the fruits of the gardens at Thanksgiving, and with flowers making special occasions. The 100th Anniversary twenty years ago brought several crafters in the congregation together to create the 100th Anniversary quilt. Created in images of landscape surrounding St. Luke's of what it may have looked like in 1901. The horse shed was included in the image as in 1901, cars were not really invented yet.

St. Luke's for at least 50 years after this building was built in 1901, has been the community hub for South Raleigh Community. Today it still is that community hub but in different ways, as community needs have changed over the years.

Today's reading describe the sky in very different ways; the reading laments the sky's destruction, and celebrates the sky's place as part of Creation. The reading remind us that we as human beings are not in control, a reality that is both terrifying and liberating at the same time. Yet the reading also reminds us that folks are working (many times in the background) to correct the wrongs we have done. Some of these wrongs are evident so many years later, and we are taking action today.

That is the story of our country churches - which includes St. Luke's. For 120 years this building has been at these four corners of Bloomfield and the Fifteenth Line, silently being the church and lifting its presence when needed by the community. As humans, we take so many things for granted; the sky, the sunrises and sunsets, the rainbows, the clouds, the moon and the stars of the night. We may also at times take our church for granted until it is needed and then we too become that driving force to help the community, the world, and the environment. We are not alone. We have our relationships with God, the world and with each other. God is always with us. Thanks be to God.

Happy 120th Anniversary St. Luke's. May God bless your work and keep you strong, ready and willing! Thanks be to God.
