Eric: For many more years than 119, we have been in partnership with St. Andrew's – as the South Buxton Pastoral Charge.

People: So much of the wilderness we have encountered together. There is support in numbers. Let us learn together what the wilderness teaches us about ourselves.

Opening Prayer:

Scripture: Romans 8: 18 – 27 – (in story form)

Today's Bible story is part of a letter that Paul wrote to the Romans. Many people lived in Rome, the capital of the Roman Empire. Paul was not always a follower of Jesus; he had been an enemy of the Christians and had them put in prison, taken them to court, and sometimes hurt them. Paul heard God's voice speaking to him when he was travelling to Damascus to arrest Christians and became a follower of Jesus. The Christians couldn't believe that this was the same man. Paul had two names. He was known by his Hebrew name Saul and also known by his Greek name Paul. Paul relied on the Holy Spirit to guide him and give him strength and hope; he wanted to share this with the new Christians. Paul wanted all people, even all creation, to hope and look forward to a wonderful future.

Dear friends,

We are all groaning in pain because we feel the hurt in our world. It seems all the world is in pain right now; it seems Earth is filled with sadness. This will not last forever. God has plans for good things for all creation. Wait for the good things that God has in mind.

When things are hard, it can be hard to wait, but we are not alone as we wait. We have each other, and we have the Holy Spirit.

The Holy Spirit will comfort and help us as we pray and wait, even helping us to know for what we should pray. The Holy Spirit knows what we need and prays for us with deep, deep sighs that speak right into God's heart.

May we all pray that through us God brings healing and happiness to all.

Message: "Seeing God in the Wilderness / Outback"

We are celebrating the Season of Creation, and today's focus is on the wilderness. Back when St. Luke's was created, wilderness or trees and forests surrounded this building. This building may have given a sense of order for this young community of faithful believers as they farmed in the wilderness – not only in the trees, but also in the fact they where miles away from anyone else.

Yet we see in the wild, a beautiful and changing world – especially as the fall colours come on the trees. This is beyond our understanding. In the wilderness, we find wonder and awe. Thinking back 119 years ago, we fantasize what it would be like to live in the middle of the wilderness. Yet in times of trouble or death, we as a faith community mourned together, and in times of joy, we rejoice together. That is the glue that holds our rural communities together.

Many Biblical readings depict the wilderness as a place of spiritual sustenance. We know the story of Jesus heading into the wilderness as he prepares for ministry. Today's reading is from Romans, and we are reminded - all creation is one. What might we learn from the wilderness about God – like Jesus did?

Our manta is, "We are not alone". Paul is telling us that today, in a letter he wrote to the Romans. That what the Rural Church is all about – sharing life and faith together in whatever comes towards us. In the wilderness of the countryside around St. Luke's and in the wilderness of being afar from any town, St. Luke's folks look after each other when they gathered for Sunday afternoon service or on Sunday night, as they gathered. Chicken dinners and potlucks were a time of coming together to

share food and fellowship. Freshly baked pies or butter tarts were always a welcome favourite. If your wife couldn't cook a pie, no problem you could get some at the church. I am sure the ladies would gather and teach one another how to bake, cook and sew. That's what Rural Church Communities just did – they supported each other.

Although we may fantasize today about wilderness like 120 years ago, we have the challenge in modern day society that the concept of wilderness is something we understand as removed from human life - likely because very few of us live in a modern day wilderness. I know I won't live well in the wilderness – I have very little wilderness skills. But it will be much easier if a bunch of you went with me. Together I may know something about this, and you may know something about that, and with all of us we can support each other and get along reasonably well.

That's what it was like in the 1900's - everyone working together to better the common community. Our community heritage has grown out of the fact that, "We are not alone!" We are not alone. Thanks be to God.
