Scripture: Hebrews 11: 1 – 3, 8 - 16 "By Faith" by Mike Authier

Faith is knowing that what God has promised will come true. Faith is what tells us that the things we cannot see can still be real.

By faith, we know that God took nothing and made everything.

By faith, Abraham and Sarah went to a new land when God called them, even without having any idea where they were going.

By faith, Abraham and Sarah lived in the land God had promised. On days it was too hot and dry and exhausting, they remembered God's promise to provide for them.

By faith, Sarah had a child, even though she was old and had never had children.

By faith, Abraham and Sarah had many children and grandchildren and great-grandchildren...as many as the stars in the sky and grains of sand on the ground.

None of these people – our faith ancestors – received everything God had promised, but they saw glimpses of God's promises, and they knew there was more to come.

By faith, we continue to do as they did; to go about our living – trusting God to care for us, and make us feel at home wherever we are, and to know that God will never leave us. Faith is believing that what God has promised will come true. Faith is what tells us that the things we cannot see can still be real.

Message: "Dynamic Faith"

"Are we there yet?" Has your child, or your spouse asked this question, when they are tired of a long journey. Today we can show them a map and with GPS how much longer we need to go. We may be traveling with someone we love on their final trip towards their death. They may wonder, "Are we there yet?" as those journeys can seem so long. We cannot use an electronic map or GPS to show them how long the journey will take. All we can do is offer to travel with them as far as we can. In faith, we travel with them, trusting they will receive their reward in heaven.

To encourage us in our faith, we look to the examples of faithful witnesses for the assurance we need to keep hoping and believing in our faith. Our faith is dynamic, and we can reflect on and grow from the faith of our past, to the faith of our future.

Faithfulness is not a matter of ritual or going through proper motions of worship. We need to discern what is faithful and true in relationship with God, giving thanks and continuing on, "the right path." God leads us to paths that lead to fullness of life.

Today's letter to the Hebrews is addressed to a Christian community that seems to have grown passive in their commitment to Christ. Hebrews begins by defining faith: "Faith is the assurance of things hoped for, the conviction of things not seen". Then Hebrews gives examples of faith, namely Abraham and Sarah. The writer of Hebrews encourages them to respond to God's calling with faith like the faith of Sarah and Abraham, especially when they cannot see the rewards of the work. Faith in things unseen - is active, not passive waiting.

Faith is more than belief. Faith is about trust and loyalty and where we dare to invest ourselves. To say we have faith in God is to do more than say it – to have faith means to live a radically different way, trusting that God takes care of tomorrow. It is that kind of faith that your loved one is living in their last days here on earth. They are actively seeking and believing in what is yet to come – even if they have not yet seen it.

Hebrews shares that faith is dynamic and constantly growing. Who is your faith ancestor that you can say, "By faith they did this or that?" Because of their faith, you live in faith for the future – even though you have not yet seen it.

We as humans, through our genes are part of our ancestry. "Within each and every one of our cells is the experience of a billion years of experimentation by its ancestors." Our faith story begins with our ancestors, Abraham and Sarah. In our recent faith stories, our ancestors can be those we are here to honour today. How has our faith been formed by the experimentation of those gone before? Have you had the opportunity to share their faith with others gathered here? Not only can we

trust of our own faith, we can also trust the faith we share in community, including the community gathered here today.

Faith reveals what matters for us, what we value most deeply, who or what we trust. Faith of our ancestors has shown us what mattered to them, what they valued deeply, and whom they trusted. Faith is more than a matter of belief. Faith reveals what we believe - in ways our words do not. Faith is active, doing, being – trusting God for the yet unseen future.

"Are we there yet?" may be a question that reveals what matters to us, what we value deeply, and whom we trust. Faith is dynamic and our faith grows each day. Our faith does not wait to see what happens. We moved forward trusting that God will provide for tomorrow, regardless of where we are on our personal journey.

We are not alone. God is always with us. Thanks be to God.
