Welcome & Announcements:

Welcome to our service on this Second Sunday of Easter. Thank you for the feedback of our shared Holy Week services. Opening Prayer:

Dear God, we need you. We need your help to open our hearts and minds to trust you with our lives, with all we hold dear. We hold out our hands to you and open them, releasing our fears and hopes into your great mercy and love. We hold out our hands to you, to be grasped by you and held within your great mercy and love. We hold out our hands to you, to be led by you in your ways of life and peace. Amen.

Scripture: John 20: 19 – 31 (By, Ken, Ann, Dani and Jordan)

NARRATOR: It was evening on that day that we call the day of resurrection, the first day of the week. The doors of the house where the disciples had met were locked for fear of the Judeans. Jesus came and stood among them.

JESUS: Peace be with you.

NARRATOR: After he said this, he showed them his hands and his side.

Jesus shows his hands and side to the congregation by holding them out and pointing. Then the disciples rejoiced.

THE DISCIPLES: shout words such as "Praise be to God," "Hallelujah" "Wow"...

The narrator holds up hands to signal when to stop.

JESUS: Peace be with you. As the Father has sent me, so I send you. And as I breathe on you, receive the Holy Spirit. If you forgive the sins of any, they are forgiven them; if you retain the sins of any, they are retained.

NARRATOR: But Thomas, who was called the Twin, one of the twelve, was not with them when Jesus came. So the disciples told him,

THE DISCIPLES: We have seen the Lord!

THOMAS: (*speaking to the disciples*) Unless I see the mark of the nails in his hands and put my finger in the mark of the nails and my hand in his side, I will not believe.

NARRATOR: A week later, Jesus' disciples were again in the house, and Thomas was with them. Although the doors were shut, Jesus came and stood among them.

JESUS: (*speaking to the disciples*) Peace be with you. (*Now speaking to Thomas*) Put your finger here and see my hands. Reach out your hand and put it in my side. Do not doubt but believe. (*Extends hand, gestures to side.*)

THOMAS: (speaking to Jesus) My Lord and my God!

JESUS: (*speaking to Thomas*) Have you believed because you have seen me? Blessed are those who have not seen and yet have come to believe.

NARRATOR: Now, Jesus did many other signs in the presence of his disciples, which are not written in this book. But these are written so that you may come to believe that Jesus is the Messiah, the Son of God, and that through believing you may have life in his name.

Reflection: "Trust, Then Rejoice!"

May God open our hearts and minds to see new life among us. May God help us to trust in God with our lives. May we know God's joyful presence in every part of our lives.

This morning is one week after we have celebrated our hallelujahs of Easter morning last Sunday. We've had a week to think deeply about what has taken place. We, in the 21st century, are removed from the actual story by 2,000 years of time and the fact that we are on the other side of the globe. But the disciples are fearfully gathered together in what was likely the Upper Room. It is not safe for them to be seen in public. The are grieving the death of their leader – the one whom they had trusted and followed. Now the disciples are lost without a purpose.

Then in bursts Mary, who tells them the tomb is empty. Simon Peter and "the other disciple" go and see the empty tomb. Did they understand what had happened? Then when they get back to the Upper Room they share with the other disciples about what they had seen and what it may have all meant. Then in bursts Mary again, who says, "I have seen the Lord!" Mary is obedient to Jesus as she then shares Jesus' words of instruction to the disciples, "I am ascending to my Father and your Father, to my God and your God". They return to their discussion, "What does this all mean?"

Later, then in bursts Jesus – right into the middle of their locked room - Jesus' first words to the disciples are, "Peace be with you!" Jesus tells the disciples, "As the Father sent me – I send you. Go with the Holy Spirit! When you forgive sins – they will be forgiven. If you retain their sins – they will be retained".

Poor Thomas. He was out that night. He did not see Jesus. When Thomas gets back to the Upper Room, the disciples tell him, "We have seen the Lord!" Oh no, not this again, Mary has already put us through this rollercoaster twice – now you want to led me astray! Give it up, you guys. I won't believe until I can see the nail holes and place my finger into Jesus' pierced side". I can imagine Thomas storming out to take time to settle his nerves. What a rollercoaster the disciples have experienced. "What is truth?" Thomas must be asking himself, much like Pilate asked Jesus a week before, "What is truth?"

Sometime later, Thomas returns to the Upper Room. You could slice the tension with a dull knife. Then once again Jesus bursts into the locked room. Jesus' first words to the disciples are, "*Peace be with you!*" Then Jesus looks right at Thomas and says, "*Thomas, put your finger here and see my hands. Reach out your hand and put it in my side. Do not doubt but believe*".

Thomas immediately replies, "My Lord and my God!" Immediately Thomas has no doubts. Immediately Thomas believes. Thomas does not need to touch his hands or put his finger in his side. No! Jesus has called his name, "Thomas". Once you are called by Name – you are a believer.

Even after Jesus called Thomas by name, Jesus asks the question that is actually for us today; "*Have you believed because you have seen me? Blessed are those who have not seen and yet have come to believe*". In reflection - It is about seeing, but it's also about hearing Jesus' voice calling your name.

We are also in locked rooms. Even for a similar reason – we don't want people to come and hurt us – to endanger us. We can come and go, but we need to do it privately. We cannot run out our front door and invite all our friends over. We can take a car ride, but just to get out. We cannot stop and have a coffee. We cannot go to a restaurant for lunch. We can go out, then just back home. I do not get the impression that people are hunkering down in fear. People are hunkering down to be cautious. We all know this is temporary, and this too will end.

Yet it can be a bit scary because we do not know how long, or whether we are really safe, which may lead us to wonder what to believe, and whom to trust. When we gather as the church, be it for worship or other church life events, we come with differing lives and experiences, yet as we call each other by name, we create a trust with each other. Right now, we are meeting electronically. Last Sunday as I helped Blenheim United with their Service, it was so comforting to have each other see one another, but what touched me was when they called each other by name. I know we may not be able to do a Zoom call with everyone, but when we connect by phone, we are calling each other by name. That call helps to settle us and helps to keep the trust we have with one another. That is the reason we must call each other.

When the Holy One we believe in offers us his greeting of, "Peace be with you," we are invited to receive God's gift of presence with joy and trust. We know we are not alone. Thanks be to God.

Offering:

We might not be able to place our money unto the offering plate, but we give of ourselves each Sunday as we also give our gifts of cash. The longer we are separated; the more we can assume that folks in our community will be affected by job loss, by being sick, or by needing to be quarantined. We as followers of Jesus, in faith, will offer our help. If you are doing okay, consider increasing your offering and gifts to support these realities.

Let us take a moment to consider the gifts we may offer today.

Pastoral Prayer & Lord's Prayer:

We celebrate that Jesus is risen! We have seen our God! It is by God's grace and in God's own holy love, we turn our hearts to the divine that surrounds and upholds us. Yet we are called, not merely to see our God, but to help make our God visible in this world: to do the work of love put into action in service to the Body of Christ. And it seems God we are reaching out and helping more these days than in our past.

And so, we pray for all for whom crucifixion still seems a clearer reality than resurrection; for those who are hungry, or unsure when and where their family's next meal will be.

Help us to be your light, O Christ.

For those who are living with mental illness, who suffer all the more from stigma and shame and social exclusion.

Help us to be your light, O Christ.

For those who work long hard days to provide for us, while risking their own health and safety.

Help us to be your light, O Christ.

For those who are now living in places of fear, where families are torn apart, and living with COVID-19 and its trauma is now a way of life.

Help us to be your light, O Christ.

Help us to learn that even in the midst of despair, there is love; even in the midst of fear, there is comfort; even in doubt, there is trust. Trust in you God, and trust in one another. May we be the active promise of new life in this community, and the blessing of God's love and grace to all who are in need. May we share the Good News: Christ is Risen!

Christ is Risen indeed! Love has conquered death!

In trust, may we return to the work of discipleship with glorious hearts and praising hands. In the name of the risen Christ, we pray his special prayer:

Our Father, Who art in heaven, Hallowed be thy name, Thy kingdom come, Thy will be done, On earth as it is in heaven, Give us this day our daily bread, And forgive us our trespasses, As we forgive those who trespass against us, And lead us not into temptation, But deliver us from evil. For thine is the kingdom, the power and the glory, forever and ever. Amen."
