Welcome & Announcements:

Welcome to our service on this Sixth Sunday of Easter. We are only a couple Sundays away from Pentecost. Today's message prepares us for the presence of the Holy Spirit coming among humanity.

Yesterday was the May 16 Miracle, where volunteers worked across Chatham-Kent to collect food for the Chatham Kent Food Banks and Soup Kitchens. Thank you to everyone who donated food. Thank you to all the volunteers who looked after the Rural Drop Offs, and for those volunteers who went house to house and collected food, and the truck drivers, the stockers and all who were involved. What a great event. We are waiting to hear the final numbers, but if other areas where as successful as the Merlin area, the food banks will be in good shape for quite a while.

This past week as we promoted the May 16 Miracle, the situation in Chatham-Kent with the Coruna Virus took a back seat. The news is mixed. We have 34 active cases up from 6, but 30 of those cases are new cases from our local Greenhouse workplace, although 50 have fully recovered – their total numbers are 80. Outside of the local workplace we are steady at 4 confirmed cases in the rest of Chatham-Kent. Our 50 and above age groups are staying the same, so that is great news. Also all 34 active cases are recovering at home. Chatham-Kent's Long Term Care facilities are still virus free – which is fantastic news. Thank you to all those who are protecting all of us.

The Holy Spirit Is Promised

Jesus said to his disciples: If you love me, you will do as I command. Then I will ask the Father to send you the Holy Spirit who will help you and always be with you. The Spirit will show you what is true. The people of this world cannot accept the Spirit, because they don't see or know him. But you know the Spirit, who is with you and will keep on living in you.

I won't leave you like orphans. I will come back to you. In a little while the people of this world won't be able to see me, but you will see me. And because I live, you will live. Then you will know that I am one with the Father. You will know that you are one with me, and I am one with you. If you love me, you will do what I have said, and my Father will love you. I will also love you and show you what I am like.

Reflection: "Love That Can Be Seen"

There are times when following Jesus feels particularly hard. Jesus himself knows how his ministry will end, yet he prepares the disciples for what will happen after his death. This is one of the four chapters in John which happens in the upper Room between sharing communion and Jesus' arrest later that night. Jesus says to his disciples, "If you love me you will do as I command". Yet many of us Christians find it hard to do what Jesus commands day after day. As much as we think we love our enemies as we love ourselves, we find times when we are complaining about our enemies and making very rude remarks about even our perceived enemies. Loving and following Jesus is against the grain of what is culturally expected and acceptable in our world today.

Jesus goes on, "I won't leave you like orphans. I will come back to you". This is exactly the experience of the living Christ that you and I know about. We where not there 2,000 years ago in the Upper Room, listening to Jesus' message to the

disciples – at least not physically. We do have all the stories of Jesus and his actions that can be a real life directional handbook. We are the generation that receives the gift of Jesus' love, as Jesus' says, "In a little while the people of this world won't be able to see me. But you will see me". Yes!

This is our Good News, We can see Jesus. Because Jesus lives, we will live. Even 20 centuries later, each of us can have a personal relationship with Jesus, the Christ. Because of that personal relationship, we want to follow his footsteps and do the things as Jesus did. We all know that it is not easy, but we still preserve and when we fall down, we get back up and start new. In this way we are sharing the love of Jesus with others.

If we are sharing the love of Jesus with others, then we are sharing God's love with each other. Jesus says, "I am one with the Father". When we do the work of Jesus, we are also doing the work of the Father. For us in the 21st century, we are like Jesus' words, "You will know you are one with me, and I am one with you." We cannot do Jesus' work, without Jesus.

Jesus also talks a lot about love. Not the love we experience in our physical world, but the love we experience in our Spiritual world. What might this look like? That's may be the point. Cause you can't see it – but you can feel it. Jesus also ties our love for Jesus with our love for God, the Father. "When you love me, you will do as I have said, and my Father will love you."

But it does not end there. Jesus tells us about the Holy Spirit. "The Father will send the Holy Spirit who will help you and always be with you. The Holy Spirit will show you what is true". The Holy Spirit is like the magnet that holds our relationship with Jesus and with God together. Like the magnetic field of a magnet – you cannot see them, but you can see their actions in the physical world. Jesus also gives us a warning - the people of this world, cannot accept the Holy Spirit, because they cannot see or know the Holy Spirit. But you do know the Holy Spirit, who is living with you and will keep living in you.

We as humans are always looking for the divine. Our divine may be God, but it could also be money, fame and lots of toys. Which divine is real? In some point of our earthly life, they may all be divine for a while. Life usually gives us hints to the truth. Is this the nudge of the Holy Spirit? Today we are reminded that our relationship with Jesus gives us the relationship with God and that the Holy Spirit will make it all real. In God's love; no matter what, we are never alone. Thanks be to God.
